

1 consultant as a non-fair and open
2 contract pursuant to the provisions of
3 N.J.S.A. 19:44 A-20.4 or 20.5, as
4 appropriate; and

5 Whereas, the engineering coordinator
6 has determined and certified in writing
7 that the value of the aggregate services
8 provided by the vendor for the term of
9 this contract will exceed \$17,500; and

10 Whereas, the anticipated term of
11 this contract is for twelve months, from
12 January 1st, 2011 through December 31st,
13 2011; and

14 Whereas, Pennoni Associates, Inc.
15 has submitted a proposal dated January
16 3rd, 2011 indicating they will provide
17 engineering services according to a fee
18 schedule attached; and

19 Whereas, Pennoni Associates, Inc.
20 has completed and submitted a Business
21 Entity Disclosure Certification which
22 certifies that said corporation has not
23 made any reportable contributions to a
24 political or candidate committee in the
25 Township of Nutley in the previous one

1 year, and that the contract will prohibit
2 Pennoni Associates from making any
3 reportable contributions through the term
4 of the contract; and

5 Whereas, the contract is not to
6 exceed \$165,000.00 for general
7 engineering services and whereas funds
8 are available from account number 1-01-
9 404-200 and have been certified by the
10 chief financial officer, said
11 certification being attached to this
12 resolution,

13 Now, therefore, be it resolved by
14 the Board of Commissioners of the
15 Township of Nutley to enter into a
16 contract with Pennoni Associates, Inc. as
17 described herein; and

18 Be it further resolved that the
19 Business Disclosure Entity Certification
20 and the Determination of Value be placed
21 on file with this resolution.

22 Be it further resolved that a notice
23 of this action shall be printed once in
24 the Nutley Sun in accordance with the
25 Local Public Contracts Law.

22 a need to acquire the services of a
23 professional real estate appraiser to
24 assist with real estate appraisals, tax
25 appeals and tax court appearances and to

1 complete the necessary procedures to
2 ensure we capture added assessments
3 arising from ongoing improvement
4 activities in the Township of Nutley as a
5 non-fair and open contract pursuant to
6 the provisions of N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.4 or
7 20.5, as appropriate; and

8 Whereas, the tax assessor has
9 determined and certified in writing that
10 the value of the aggregate services
11 provided by the vendor for the year will
12 exceed 17,500 dollars; and

13 Whereas, Hendricks Appraisal
14 Company, LLC, 7 Hutton Avenue, West
15 Orange, NJ has submitted a fee schedule
16 for providing such services, the total of
17 which is not to exceed 45,000 dollars;
18 and

19 Whereas, the anticipated term of
20 this contract is for twelve months, from
21 period of February 1st, 2011 through
22 February 1st, 2012;

23 I think there's a modification. I
24 don't think -- I have a question, this
25 can't lapse? So, this would be for an

1 eleven month period, February 1 through
2 December 31st, 2011.

3 Whereas, Hendricks Appraisal
4 Company, LLC has completed and submitted
5 a Business Entity Disclosure
6 Certification which certifies that they
7 have not made any reportable
8 contributions to a political or candidate
9 committee in the Township of Nutley in
10 the previous one year, and that the
11 contract will prohibit them from making
12 any reportable contributions through the
13 term of the contract; and

14 Whereas, funds are available from
15 account 1-01-204-205 and have been
16 certified by the chief financial officer,
17 said certification being attached to this
18 resolution,

19 Now, therefore, be it resolved by
20 the Board of Commissioners of the
21 Township of Nutley authorizes the Mayor
22 to enter into a contract with Hendricks
23 Appraisal Company, LLC; and

24 Be it further resolved that the
25 Business Disclosure Entity Certification

1 and the Determination of Value be placed
2 on file with this resolution.

2 for recreation supplies were mistakenly
3 calculated by Mainiero's; and

4 Whereas, after consultation with the
5 Division of Local Government Services it
6 has been determined that the second low
7 bidder Metuchen Sports Center, be awarded
8 a contract to provide Little League
9 Baseballs, and softball chest protectors
10 to the Township,

11 Now, therefore, be it resolved, by
12 the Board of Commissioners of the
13 Township of Nutley that a contract of the
14 purchase of Recreation supplies be
15 awarded to Metuchen Sports Center, as per
16 the attached sheet, not to exceed 2,605
17 dollars; and

18 Whereas, funds are available from
19 account number 0-01-506-200 and have been
20 certified by the Chief Financial Officer
21 and said certification is attached to
22 this Resolution,

6 Whereas, a combination of heart
7 healthy nutrition, living a healthy
8 lifestyle and following your healthcare
9 professional's recommendations are all
10 part of reducing an individual's risk for
11 heart disease, heart attack and stroke;
12 and

13 Whereas, February is National Heart
14 Health Month, and Go Red For Women is the
15 American Heart Association's national
16 call to increase awareness of heart
17 disease -- the leading cause of death in
18 women -- and to inspire women to take
19 charge of their heart health; and

20 Whereas, Friday, February 4, 2011 is
21 National Wear Red Day; and

22 Whereas, the Township of Nutley
23 Department of Public Affairs, through its
24 Health Department, and the American Heart
25 Association are committed to preventing

1 heart disease through public and
2 professional education about the risk
3 factors;

4 Therefore, be it resolved by the
5 Mayor and Board of Commissioners, in the
6 Township of Nutley, that in recognition
7 of the importance of the ongoing effort
8 to prevent heart disease, we do hereby
9 proclaim February 2011 as National Heart
10 Health Month and will urge all citizens
11 in Nutley, NJ to show their support for

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner

5 Scarpelli?

6 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

12 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Cocchiola?

14 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Aye.

15 That concludes the regular business
16 portion of our meetingn Is there any
17 member of the public that would like to
18 address the Board this evening?

19 Dr. Rumroth (ph.), you want to come
20 up?

21 DR. RUMROTH: Hi. I just wanted to
22 let you know I feel oldn 1902, sitting
23 here waiting for you, the town was only
24 forty-three years old when I was born on
25 (indiscernible) Avenue. That makes me

1 really feel oldn

2 And in the meeting you made
3 reference to January 2nd, with the -- I'm
4 referring to the positions -- the
5 civilian positions that you were
6 discussing -- I know a lot of thought was
7 put in, and I talked to different people
8 in the fire department. And this is --
9 and I know it's a thing in the future and
10 what you have to do.

11 My only concern is, I got it January
12 6th, when I read the Nutley Sun, when I
13 came back from a vacation. And there are
14 a few things in that little article that
15 caught my eye, and I just want to bring
16 it to your attention. Is there a job
17 description on these jobs? I understand
18 this is civil servicen We're
19 replacing -- I'm just need more
20 information.

21 Talking while we're waiting, I
22 understand it is a civilized --

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Dr. Rumroth, are
24 you referring to the ordinance that was
25 tabled this evening, I think? Is that

1 what you're referring to?

2 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Yes.

3 DR. RUMROTH: Well, did you pass the
4 second one?

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No.

6 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: No, we did not.
7 We tabled that.

8 DR. RUMROTH: All right. Well, I'm
9 not even -- I'm just saying, it's a good
10 idean My only question is, as long as
11 there's a job description, what type of
12 civil service test do you have to do? I
13 mean, that's just the thought process to
14 bring up. The other thing concerned me,
15 I'm reading and I saw the salaries, and I
16 said, assistant chief. Then it said,
17 chief volunteer. Now, what does the
18 chief volunteer mean?

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I'm not -- you
20 know what? Commissioner Petracco, you
21 better address this.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That
23 ordinance is the salaries of the fire
24 department. Assistant chief is a
25 volunteer position in Nutley, and they

1 get a stipend, so that -- I think that's
2 the one your talking about.

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: It -- yes --

4 DR. RUMROTH: Right. But my
5 question is, when I was in the military,
6 I was a major. The colonel told me what
7 to do; I did what he did -- told me to
8 do. Now, if you have a volunteer, does
9 he have the same criteria of a chief, if
10 he's volunteer? Because he does the
11 civil service --

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Actually, in
13 our town, which I'm sure you're aware, we
14 have a volunteer department and we have a
15 career department. So, the chief
16 position is actually on the volunteer
17 side. And then we have --

18 DR. RUMROTH: That's my point,
19 but --

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- then we
21 have a deputy chief on the career side.

22 DR. RUMROTH: But does the deputy
23 chief have to obey the orders of the
24 chief?

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes.

1 DR. RUMROTH: That's my concern.
2 The criteria for the -- I mean, we have
3 volunteers in most towns, but I don't know how
4 the training -- did he take the civil
5 service test that a chief would take?

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: He didn't
7 take the civil service test, no. But he
8 goes for certification (indiscernible)
9 and proper training.

10 DR. RUMROTH: Well, I'm board
11 certified in what I do, and a lot of
12 people are certified to do certain things,
13 but they're not board certified. Now, my
14 question is, does that mean that if he
15 gives an order -- there's a fire, and our
16 assistant chief isn't there, and we have
17 a lieutenant, is he required to make
18 those decisions for our firemen?

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes, if he's
20 on site. Usually, what would happen at a
21 fire, you know, because he's a volunteer,
22 an acting officer would make those
23 decisions until he got. But usually when
24 he gets there, the fire's already a
25 working fire, and he just

1 (indiscernible).

2 DR. RUMROTH: So, if we get a
3 volunteer to be a lieutenant or a
4 captain, he can take that job as a
5 volunteer?

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We don't
7 have a lieutenant, sir. We have
8 assistant chiefsn

9 DR. RUMROTH: No, no, I don't mean
10 that. I mean, by definition, he's a
11 volunteer chiefn

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

13 DR. RUMROTH: Could you get a
14 volunteer lieutenant or a volunteer
15 captain?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think we
17 would have to change the ordinance to do
18 that.

19 DR. RUMROTH: That's what I mean
20 Is there an ordinance for us having a
21 chief that's a volunteer, and not a --

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: There's an
23 ordinance to have a volunteer chiefn And
24 it's been like that for the last fifty,
25 sixty yearsn

1 DR. RUMROTH: (indiscernible) about
2 that time.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: About that
4 timen

5 DR. RUMROTH: Okay. And then the
6 other question I guess would be when will
7 this come up to this table?

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: The one that
9 was tabled, Doctor, was the one with the
10 new commissions on, HazMat positions
11 (indiscernible)n.

12 DR. RUMROTH: Well, I learned a
13 little bit about that this evening
14 sitting out here. And it's interesting
15 because it sounds like the job would be
16 made for a volunteer -- you'd like to
17 have a volunteer fireman in that
18 position, so that he could go to a fire,
19 if there was a firen

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Absolutelyn

21 DR. RUMROTH: Because right now, I
22 guess, we have paid firemen doing that
23 job, that would go if there was a fire.

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No, actually
25 right now, we really have any

1 (indiscernible) very short handed there,
2 and we really don't have anyone
3 (indiscernible) really technically
4 facilitate (indiscernible) have one
5 person on that right now. We've been
6 trying to run it off shift
7 (indiscernible) but it's been failing.
8 That's why we were looking to create
9 those (indiscernible)n.

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Doctor, to your
11 question (indiscernible) those positions
12 (indiscernible)n.

13 DR. RUMROTH: Oh, no, I don't mean
14 that. I mean, he'd be available to
15 actually fight a fire.

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: The firemen
17 (indiscernible) -- would have volunteered
18 (indiscernible).

19 DR. RUMROTH: Okay, thanks.

20 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you, Dr.
21 Rumroth. Is there anyone else that would
22 like to address the Board this evening?

23 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Move to
24 adjourn.

25 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Second.

1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Reilly.

2 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Mr. Reilly.

3 You've got to be quicker.

4 MR. REILLY: Good evening.

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Good evening, Mr.
6 Reilly.

7 MR. REILLY: I have three questions.
8 My first question is, the Board of
9 Commissioners met with the powers of
10 Belleville, Bloomfield, and
11 (indiscernible), correct? Shared
12 services meeting?

13 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Yes.

14 MR. REILLY: And I believe at that
15 meeting it was discussed that you
16 would --

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI:
18 (indiscernible).

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I'm sorry, Clifton
20 was not there. It was Belleville,
21 Bloomfield, and Nutley.

22 MR. REILLY: Sorry? (indiscernible)
23 talking to Dr. Scarpelli after the
24 meeting, and he said to me
25 (indiscernible) in regard to shared

1 services as well as that your
2 (indiscernible) --

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: That's our plan,
4 yes. That's probably -- we having a
5 little bit of trouble just getting our
6 minutes out from the last meeting, and we
7 have a letter that we comprised to the
8 Governor. That's taken a little longer
9 than we thought to get done. But yes,
10 our next step is to meet with the members
11 of the Board of Education, however you
12 would like it, whether it'd be the full
13 board or you, or representatives, however
14 you would like to do --

15 MR. REILLY: (indiscernible) a time
16 line?

17 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: We can discuss it
18 tonight if you want.

19 MR. REILLY: (indiscernible) we're
20 available for (indiscernible) love to
21 discuss shared services (indiscernible).
22 Secondly, we received recently, or the
23 superintendent received recently, a
24 traffic study for Bloomfield Avenue in
25 reference to Radcliffe school that was

1 done by Jack Barry.

2 And last night at our board meeting,
3 one of the parents asked who directed
4 that study to be done, and I didn't have
5 (indiscernible)n. Can you tell us who
6 directed Mr. Barry to conduct
7 (indiscernible) in regard to --

8 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I could not,
9 Commissioner Evans do you --

10 COMMISSIONER EVANSm Originally,
11 Jack reports on (indiscernible).

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCOM Mr. Reilly,
13 I can answer that.

14 MR. REILLY: Please.

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCOM I did have a
16 conversation with Jack Barry, because he
17 was (indiscernible) very curious
18 (indiscernible) traffic data.

19 MR. REILLY: Well, I'm just trying
20 to get a handle so I can answer thatn I
21 promised that parent that I'd get back to
22 him.

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: So, that's -- is
24 that the genesis of it, that you,
25 Commissioner Petracco, requested Mr.

1 Barry to do that? That's --

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Actually,
3 Mr. Barry was already (indiscernible)
4 whatever information he had I would like
5 (indiscernible).

6 MR. REILLY: Perfectn And I
7 appreciate that, if you'd sit down with
8 Mr. Barry and discuss the study, if
9 it's --

10 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO:
11 (indiscernible).

12 MR. REILLY: Okay, because I have
13 some questions --

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO:
15 (indiscernible).

16 MR. REILLY: Oh, terrific. That
17 would be great. And the third thing is I
18 just wanted to let the Commissioners know
19 that last night the Board of Education
20 approved the resolution to move forward
21 with pre-referendum services for solar
22 (indiscernible) district in Nutley.
23 Solar panels, hopefully, if a referendum
24 is approved by the public (indiscernible)
25 the election (indiscernible) hopefully

1 we'll have solar panels on six schools,
2 that will (indiscernible) burst
3 substantial revenue generating program
4 that (indiscernible) Board of Education
5 has ever had in Nutley.

6 So, we anxiously anticipate the
7 passage (indiscernible) referendum. We
8 looked at two different (indiscernible)
9 schedules so far, a twelve year schedule,
10 a fifteen year schedulen (Indiscernible)
11 based on a (indiscernible) value of 432
12 dollars and change, we anticipate that
13 the tax implication will be
14 (indiscernible) per household, 345
15 thousand dollar value, twelve year
16 (indiscernible). I haven't really have
17 it down, yet, and where we're going to go
18 with that. But, I decided hopefully
19 (indiscernible).

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: What was the
21 total amount of that referendum you were
22 speaking of?

23 MR. REILLY: It was a seven million
24 dollar referdum. 3.r9 million dollars
25 approximately was allocated towards the

1 panels themselves, and we'd like to also
2 tie in three million in technology
3 improvements (indiscernible) safety,
4 (indiscernible) sidewalks, playgrounds --

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Mr. Reilly, as
6 I'm sure you're aware, I did some very
7 extensive research into this --

8 MR. REILLY: Right. You and I have
9 had a discussion about this.

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- and we were
11 ready to move forward. We visited with
12 some very knowledgeable people, and did
13 extensive research. However, at the
14 time, there were no grants available.
15 All right? Because if there were, we
16 would in fact have applied for them, and
17 with the grant people we have on board
18 are fairly confident that we would have
19 been successful.

20 The only caution I would lend to it,
21 and obviously I am a proponent of solar
22 energy. One of my ideas going back three
23 years, and I think it's something great
24 to pursue, but in light of what's going
25 on on a national level, I wouldn't be so

1 quick to go out to referendum in this
2 climate, only because it's one of the
3 President's initiatives. All right? To
4 convert to a green economy and to move in
5 that direction, which if we read between
6 the lines a little bit, may mean that
7 there may be some dollars flowing down
8 from Washington.

9 So, just something to think about,
10 something to keep in the back of your
11 mind.

12 MR. REILLY: Oh, we've definitely
13 thought about it, and we've asked all the
14 professionals. Last night, we had our
15 architect at the meeting, our bond
16 counsel at the meeting. We had a
17 representative from Public Services at
18 the meeting. And a former Board
19 Secretary Business (indiscernible)
20 Bayonne (indiscernible) schools in the
21 State of New Jersey (indiscernible) --

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Actually I
23 think it was one of the ones that I've
24 used as an example many times. My
25 question, and my word of caution, doesn't

1 go to the expertise that you've gathered
2 to come to present to you. I think that
3 that's very good, and something to be
4 applauded. My concern is, on the
5 budgetary side and the dollars, not
6 knowing what kind of money will flow from
7 Trenton to the school district, and just
8 dealing with the obstacles that we're
9 dealing with here, and the challenges
10 that we have to keep the tax rate as low
11 as possible. Just something to keep in
12 mind.

13 MR. REILLY: No, and clearly,
14 obviously, Commissioner (indiscernible)
15 anticipated negative feedback
16 (indiscernible) with this. But here's
17 what we know is in pure evidence if
18 you're allow me the latitude. For one,
19 the Board Secretary from Bayonne, who
20 retired in July, or July 1, after
21 (indiscernible) Bayonne, has eight years
22 of history with solar heating
23 (indiscernible). Last year that district
24 was (indiscernible) system, realized 1.6
25 million dollar revenue (indiscernible)

1 district. Our system would be half of
2 that. (Indiscernible) realize half of
3 that in the current asrak value. Now,
4 just so anybody's --

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Which -- excuse
6 me -- which do vary, okay?

7 MR. REILLY: Yes, I'm --

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I'm sure they
9 told you that. The asrak is not a fixed
10 number.

11 MR. REILLY: There's no question
12 about it.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay.

14 MR. REILLY: But here's what we
15 understandn

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Is there an
17 average to that though?

18 MR. REILLY: Well, I'm going to
19 discuss that Commissioner. Here's what
20 we know. We know that currently the
21 asrak value is over 650 dollar. Asrak
22 meaning Solar Renewable Energy Credit,
23 that's what's sold on a commodity
24 exchange. That's what's generating solar
25 energy. The estimate I gave you on the

1 four dollar or eight dollar tax
2 implication per household is based on a
3 \$432.50 (indiscernible) value. So, we're
4 anticipating tax value on a low asrak
5 valuen

6 By the way, I think they said that
7 it hasn't been that low in seven or eight
8 years, so they only anticipate it to go
9 down, but obviously it does fluctuate,
10 and we understand that, and we took that
11 into considerationn But to generate, you
12 know, that type of revenue and having a
13 tax implication under ten dollars over a
14 fifteen year span or a twelve year span,
15 generate that type of revenue
16 (indiscernible) solar, have green energy
17 in our town and planet, have, you know --
18 and you can only take an asrak value for
19 a maximum of fifteen (indiscernible)
20 after that you can no longer take it.

21 But what does go on forever is the
22 electric savings. Besides the asrak
23 value that we anticipate being between
24 500,000 and 600,000 dollars annually, we
25 know we'll realize a minimum of 125,000

1 dollars savings annually on our electric
2 bill.

3 So, in looking at all the components
4 and hearing from most of the
5 professionals -- as a matter of fact, all
6 the professionals -- that were there last
7 night, and that I've spoken to over the
8 last six months since I've investigated
9 solar deeply is that they don't really
10 anticipate that much of a fluctuation
11 downward in asrak value, and they
12 don't -- clearly do not anticipate grant
13 money on the local, state or federal
14 level for anytime in the future. And I
15 understand you're saying you anticipate
16 (indiscernible) after you and I had this
17 discussion --

18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: No, no, no, I
19 didn't say I anticipated, I said that if
20 you read between the lines, all right,
21 based upon what's coming out of
22 Washington, I'd just be attuned to that.
23 And I mean, we could have an in-depth
24 conversation and go over the pros and
25 cons of this, you know, at some other

1 time if you'd like.

2 My concern, if you will, is I know
3 there's a payback period where you
4 actually pay for the equipment, which is
5 paid for from the dollars generated from
6 the asraks, because that's the only place
7 the money comes from. I mean, as far as
8 energy saving, something that you
9 wouldn't have to go out to bond for, that
10 you might want to consider, is joining
11 the Sustainable Energy Meeting, like we
12 in the Township did, where we saved just
13 on the electricity side, 85,000 dollars a
14 year off our bill by doing absolutely
15 nothing.

16 We're now going out to the
17 Sustainable Energy Meeting, which is like
18 a JIF, it's a group of folks that come
19 together for natural gas, all right,
20 which prices also fluctuate. In addition
21 to that, we've participated and we were
22 successful in obtaining a grant for the
23 public service direct install program,
24 which will save us another ten to fifteen
25 percent on top of that. And we're in

1 line -- and we did two buildings -- and
2 we're in line to do the balance of the
3 municipal buildings here in town at zero
4 cost. And, again, I bring this up, not
5 to dampen your efforts --

6 MR. REILLY: Oh, no, no, no --

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- because I
8 think that they're to be applauded, and I
9 like the forward thinking of the Board.
10 I think that's something that's positive
11 and that we need more of, all right? But
12 these are just some other things that you
13 can do without incurring any expense.
14 And again, I bring this up in the context
15 of the uncertainty that we have in the
16 dollars coming out in Trenton, and not
17 knowing what expenses we're going to have
18 to pick up in the very near future.

19 MR. REILLY: Well, here's what we
20 know. We know that we need technology
21 desperately in this (indiscernible)n. You
22 go from school to school and look at the
23 technology from school to school, it's
24 not consistent. It's not fair for the
25 haves and the haves not, to go into

1 Spring Garden and see technology, to go
2 into (indiscernible) state of the art
3 technology after we spend --

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I'm not
5 speaking to technology and broad brush;
6 I'm just speaking specifically to that
7 solar.

8 MR. REILLY: Let me finish, please.
9 No, but that's part of it. The reason
10 that we want to move forward with it,
11 now, rather than wait, is because we
12 can't wait for technology
13 (indiscernible). We can't wait for maybe
14 grant money out there down the road when
15 we're totally inept as far as our
16 technology compared to districts like
17 Millburn and Livingston and Glen Ridge,
18 and districts that we're compared to
19 everyday, and every week, in every year,
20 and how come we'll not making the New
21 Jersey monthly top seventy-five schools.
22 Well, we don't have what we need. This
23 would dramatically help us.

24 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Did you just move
25 the discussion from solar to technology,

1 or are we still on --

2 MR. REILLY: It's all in the
3 referendum.

4 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: He's
5 tying it in -- I mean this is a good
6 conversation, but I just hearing him on
7 that.

8 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Can I ask you a
9 question, Mrn Reilly?

10 MR. REILLY: I'm tying it in,
11 because it's all part of one referendum.
12 It's not just solar technology; it's
13 solar technology and moving forward with
14 technology in the Nutley school system,
15 because right now, in our budget which
16 (indiscernible) --

17 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Mr. Reilly, I
18 don't want to cut you short, but I
19 understand that you packaged it that way,
20 but I guess, what the point is -- it
21 doesn't have to be that way. That's your
22 choicem

23 MR. REILLY: I understand.

24 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You and your
25 board, you're an independent board --

1 MR. REILLY: No question.

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- and you
3 folks make your own decisions, and we
4 would never want to encroach upon any of
5 that authority. But, it can be done
6 differently, that's my only point. And I
7 understand your position--

8 MR. REILLY: I'm not disagreeing
9 with you, and I understand the
10 (indiscernible) and I'll go to one at
11 this point --

12 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Reilly, one
13 second, can I take -- can I just ask
14 you -- did your presenters who were at
15 your board meeting, Mr. Reilly, did they
16 go through the pros and cons of purchase
17 as opposed to lease and a PPA? Did they
18 go through --

19 MR. REILLY: Of course.

20 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: So, and your
21 decision is that you wanted to do the
22 outright purchase as opposed to --

23 MR. REILLY: Our decision is that
24 right now we have 80,000 dollars
25 allocated for technology in the 2011

1 (indiscernible) budget --

2 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: No, I'm talking
3 about the solar, the solar, not the --

4 MR. REILLY: All part of the same
5 thing, your --

6 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Well, what do you
7 mean by technology in the schools? Is
8 that --

9 MR. REILLY: Because part of the
10 seven million dollar number that the
11 Commissioner asked me about -- how do we
12 come up with the seven million dollars?
13 We came up with needs of technology and
14 safety and security, that's how we come
15 up with the other three million dollars,
16 because 80,000 dollars in a budget for
17 technology means it's going to take us
18 forever to get where to we need to get.

19 This solar energy allows us to get
20 there in a year from now, two years from
21 now, as far as our technology, safety and
22 the rest of our needs that we have as far
23 as though areas are concerned. So, you
24 can't separate the two. And I appreciate
25 what the Commissioner's saying --

1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: You're saying
2 because you're saving money --

3 MR. REILLY: -- and by the way, let
4 me say one other thing, because we did
5 the coop route before, you know. Four
6 years ago I sat in a meeting with former
7 president of the Nutley Board of
8 Education and myself and the board
9 secretary and a member of public service,
10 where we spoke about the difference
11 between joining a coop when the therm was
12 \$1.40 a therm, and the board decided to
13 join that coop against my wishes, and
14 against the wishes of Public Service.
15 And you know what happened? The therm
16 went down 70 cents a therm from \$1.40.
17 So, we were tied up in a coop for two
18 years --

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I understand
20 that. I know you guys had a bad gas
21 deal.

22 MR. REILLY: Yeah, horrible.

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I mean the same
24 problems that you guys run into with the
25 Geo thermal heating. Okay? I know there

1 were flaws with that toon This is not a
2 coop in the true sense of the word. This
3 is a meeting that's formed by state
4 statute to conduct reverse auctions --

5 MR. REILLY: I'd like to sit down
6 and have a conversation --

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- and again,
8 because the numbers -- and we just went
9 up -- because the numbers were not
10 appropriate for what we needed, and what
11 we felt the term of this contract is,
12 which will only be eleven to twelve
13 months, all bids were rejected, so
14 they're going out again.

15 MR. REILLY: I'd love to sit down
16 with you and discuss this.

17 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: My only word to
18 you was just be aware, and I'm sure you
19 are, but be aware, and be cautious,
20 especially in these times, all right?
21 And the bundling, that's a board
22 decision. That's what you folks decided.
23 I mean, there are a lot of different ways
24 to go about doing a lot of different
25 things. And all of us, five here, we all

1 have our own opinions on how we do
2 thingsn It was just suggestion, all
3 right? Just something to take into
4 considerationn

5 MR. REILLY: And I appreciate itn
6 Listen (indiscernible) you know, we're
7 all one tax dollar, okay?

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Exactlyn

9 MR. REILLY: It's not us against
10 them, you against me, we're all in the
11 same community doing the same thing for
12 the same public. I get it. To answer
13 you question directly, Mayor, because I
14 didn't answer your question yet, you
15 asked me a question about what if we have
16 a third party outside company come in and
17 pay for the solar, what kind of benefit
18 do we reap?

19 Well, the only benefit we reap at
20 that point is an electrical savings, and
21 that's it. They reap a hundred percent
22 of the asrak benefit, which is the whole
23 package. That's why they do it. That's
24 where the benefit is.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I have a

1 question, Mr. Reilly, if I may?

2 MR. REILLY: Pleasen

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCON Do you have
4 one, Joe?

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Oh, yeah,
6 Commissioner Petracco, and Commissioner
7 Scarpelli after you.

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I don't have
9 all the answers, but if I have it, I'll
10 give it to youn If I don't have it, I'll
11 get it.

12 MR. REILLYn I appreciate your helpn

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCON I looked at
14 solar for my own properties also, my
15 business. And I know we need a certain
16 amount of a fieldn Now, do you have any
17 information on what the costs is -- I
18 know -- how about the return? How long
19 will it take, for you, depending on how
20 big your field is, before our break even
21 point is to pay for it adequately?

22 MR. REILLY: Well, that dependsn It
23 a great questionn It depends. Because
24 based on what the architect came up with,
25 which was an asrak value of 432 dollars,

1 it would take us seven years to get back
2 the upfront money.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Your
4 investmentn

5 MR. REILLY: At the 650 or 675
6 current rate of the asrak, it would go
7 much quicker.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: So, your
9 investment, it would take approximately
10 six years to get back?

11 MR. REILLY: No, again, the asrak
12 fluctuates --

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I think he said
14 seven.

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Seven?

16 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I think what he
17 said was seven.

18 MR. REILLY: Here's my question, it
19 pays for itself, that's the bottom line.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No, it pays
21 for itself, and then it generates money
22 as a revenue?

23 MR. REILLY: Correct.

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And are you
25 looking to package that together with the

1 technology and pay for that --

2 MR. REILLY: Correct.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That was my
4 question. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI:
6 Commissioner Tucci, I'm going by
7 recollection. But a couple of years ago,
8 didn't you meet with the company that had
9 some sort of zero building -- zero energy
10 building.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes,
12 (indiscernible) technology.

13 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: They had
14 some other things to be included with the
15 solar --

16 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: -- to get
18 more costs savings.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes,
20 Commissioner.

21 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Was that a PPA
22 though, or was that --

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: No, that was
24 not a PPA. Okay?

25 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Just for

1 everybody's edification, a PPA is a power
2 purchase agreement.

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Power purchase
4 agreement.

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That was not a
6 PPA. There were separate ones, because
7 you need to be very careful with PPAs,
8 because there are a lot of them out there
9 where the company actually reaps all of
10 the benefit and makes all the profit.

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Usually that's how
12 it works.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You're stuck
14 with solar panels, stuck in a good sense
15 in the beginning, but there's maintenance
16 that's also associated with them, and a
17 life expectancy. All right? What we did
18 was we looked at the solar panels as one
19 element of an overall program that went
20 into energy efficiency with PSEG picking
21 the low hanging fruit, if you will,
22 putting the reflectors in, changing the
23 light bulbs, joining the SEM, and then
24 having real time monitoring in place
25 which would pinpoint for you very

1 exactly, all right, exactly where you
2 were losing your energy, whether it was
3 heat or air conditioning or whatever, or
4 just stray electricity, all right, and
5 where you needed to direct your energies
6 to cut that off and to begin saving thatn

7 So, no, Mayor, to your question, it
8 was not a PPA, a straight-out PPA, at
9 all, and the payback was a lot quicker,
10 but there were several steps to get
11 there. And, again, that's part of the
12 reason, and I'm glad you bring that up,
13 because there were so many PPAs, all
14 right, that didn't benefit the host
15 communities, you know. And I know there
16 situation is a little different. Their
17 roofs are all new; they're an ideal
18 candidate for this, but you need to be
19 very, very careful.

20 MR. REILLY: I'm glad you brought
21 that up, Commissioner, because it brings
22 me to my next point, which is
23 (indiscernible) A, the question was asked
24 last night to the former board secretary
25 of Bayonne, what have your maintenance

1 costs been in Bayonne over the last eight
2 years? He said the number was zeron
3 Now, I guess --

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Well, typically
5 in the first half, they have another
6 twenty to twenty-five year life
7 expectancy.

8 MR. REILLY: Correctn

9 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: The first half
10 it's very half it's very little, but as
11 you go on, then there's a cost associated
12 with thatn

13 MR. REILLY: Now, let's talk about
14 that as well, because -- for your
15 edification and those on the Commission,
16 it's anticipated for the first ten years
17 (indiscernible) ninety-percent efficiency
18 in the first ten years, and then they
19 guarantee you eighty percent productivity
20 for the next ten yearsn

21 And it (indiscernible) -- they say a
22 twenty-five year life expectancy, right,
23 Commissioner? But what they told us last
24 night is that it still worksn It may not
25 work at eighty percent or seventy-five

1 percent, but you're still generating
2 revenue even if you (indiscernible). But
3 hopefully, you know, over the next few
4 years of revenue generation, it might pay
5 for itself to get the next system,
6 wherever that technology lies at that
7 time.

8 But you know, we talk about, you
9 know -- I've been on the board for six
10 years; I took a year off. I've been
11 involved, you know, with the construction
12 for fifteen years as a volunteer with a
13 few failed referendums, so I understand
14 what a referendum is and what a taxpayer
15 in Nutley (indiscernible) -- I'm a
16 taxpayer; I get it.

17 But I will tell you this, we've
18 spoken ad nauseum about shared services,
19 about revenue generation, and we've
20 beaten people over the head in this town,
21 like yourself, who own a business, and
22 Mr. Petracco, and everybody else, and we
23 go to people for donations constantly. I
24 mean, you're getting bombarded with
25 flyers and brownies and cub scouts, and

1 everybody else coming and looking for --

2 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER:

3 (Indiscernible).

4 MR. REILLY: And you know, Sal
5 (indiscernible) did a great job, with
6 Jerry (indiscernible), when they were
7 president and vice president going to
8 banks and trying to generate some revenue
9 and monies. But you know what? We never
10 scratched the surface. We really didn't
11 get anyway. We garnered a couple of
12 thousand dollars. We're talking about
13 millions of dollars here. Millions, not
14 tens of thousands, we're talking about
15 millions. This is a serious, tangible
16 revenue generating program that's never
17 happened in the history of
18 (indiscernible)n.

19 I'm passionate about it. And you're
20 rightn Do I have a little trepidation?
21 I have a little trepidation, no question
22 about it. Does the taxpayer have
23 trepidation, no question about it. Are
24 they sick and tired of tax increases? We
25 all are. But here's something that

1 you're talking about four dollars and
2 eight dollars per household on a 350,000
3 dollar home, for green energy and a
4 revenue generation program, that's going
5 to get us new sidewalks, new playgrounds,
6 new curbs, new floors that we haven't
7 had, with holes in floors and walls and
8 whatever security we're missing.

9 We didn't have cameras in the middle
10 school, when we did the middle school
11 referendum. I mean, we're going have
12 security there. We're going to have Wi-
13 Fi throughout and hopefully tie that Wi-
14 Fi in with Nutley. We're going to have a
15 more secure facility. The Commissioner
16 and I, Petracco, have talked about, you
17 know, more lock down drills, and how
18 important these lock down drills are with
19 fire alarms being pressed, and, you know,
20 how quickly we can get that information
21 to the police department, to
22 headquarters, so they have instantaneous
23 information.

24 This is not just about solar. This
25 is an all encompassing project, that's, I

1 believe it's well-thought out. Can we do
2 better? We can always do better. We
3 have, you know, in our opinion, we have a
4 short period of time to get the message
5 out to the public on what our direction
6 is, and we're going to do the best job we
7 can. I hope you guys support us in that.
8 Thank you very much for your time.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Commissioner
10 Evans, I think -- Commissioner Evans
11 wanted to address you.

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, so my
13 question is, so I heard about revenue,
14 but I also heard about, I believe, a cost
15 increase. So, net-net so far, what will
16 happen to your budget is that this
17 decision will increase your debt by seven
18 million dollars, will have the effect of
19 raising the cost to a taxpayer, four
20 dollars, five dollars per household for
21 this one capital item.

22 What's the -- my question is more a
23 broader context. What's the overall
24 increase to the taxpayer that you're
25 expecting? And the reason why I ask that

1 is because we're struggling. We're
2 dealing with trying to hit a two percent
3 cap that's mandatory by the state,
4 healthcare and pension costs are excluded
5 from that, which are driving that two
6 percent to a least a five percent
7 increase.

8 We're trying to do -- we've
9 minimized -- we've laid off firemen;
10 we've laid off police officers. We've
11 reduced authorized head counts, right?
12 We've asked for givebacks. Everyone of
13 these departments have eliminated people,
14 in order to keep our share of the costs
15 down. What's challenging for me is, is
16 that we represent thirty-five percent of
17 whatever the tax bill is. You guys are
18 forty-eight percent of that tax bill; the
19 county is seventeen percent of the tax
20 bill.

21 So, my question is, while it has the
22 potential for revenue, and it has the
23 potential for all these improvements, all
24 I really heard so far was that it has the
25 potential of having a real tax increase

1 to the taxpayer today, who, one, can't
2 have that happen, because in the last
3 year, we've had fifty homes that were
4 subject to short sales bankruptcies,
5 right? We've been notified of another
6 290 that are subject to pending
7 foreclosure, right?

8 So, they're struggling. We've had
9 76 million dollars in losses of assessed
10 values of properties for this coming
11 year, and 400 million dollars last year
12 for that. And we also, unfortunately, we
13 are a community that's not getting its
14 fair share of state aid. The mayor and I
15 went down to the state reminding them of
16 that, yesterday.

17 So, my question is, as I applaud the
18 effort to go on solar, but I don't have a
19 real good understanding of what does it
20 mean, in the overall context of the fact
21 -- of what's going to happen to the
22 taxpayer, because your outstanding debt
23 is between 50 and 60 million. It's going
24 up another 7 million. The municipal debt
25 is around (indiscernible), right now.

1 Our borrowing power's got a ceiling of
2 140 million, of which you guys are most
3 of it, right? So, I have these
4 questions. I also have a question,
5 because, in the context of the climate
6 we're in, the (indiscernible) that we're
7 all facing, I haven't heard from anybody
8 from your board about having us sit down
9 to talk about what are financial
10 ramifications of what we're doing.

11 You also have a contract in place,
12 which, I believe, has an overall cap on
13 it, of a 3.9 percent salary increase,
14 that you have to live through, which
15 means in a (indiscernible) world, how are
16 you going to address that, but so far,
17 this particular nugget, while it sounds
18 nice, I have deep concerns about what the
19 overall impact is on the (indiscernible).

20 MR. REILLY: Well, let me answer
21 your first question, I think the most
22 important question that I drew from what
23 you were (indiscernible). You haven't
24 heard from anybody on the Board of
25 Education. I'm standing before you right

1 now to talk about it. The reason you
2 haven't heard from anybody, is I don't
3 have a budget yet. We've been working on
4 a budget for three months.

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: So have we

6 MR. REILLY: So, to come to you
7 before we're even close, I mean
8 (indiscernible) -- I wish we were closer
9 than we are, and we've had probably
10 fifteen budget and finance
11 (indiscernible) over the last twelve
12 months.

13 For the first time in the history of
14 the Board of Education, that I'm familiar
15 with, about two months ago, I asked for
16 the full board to participate in this
17 budget because this was the first time
18 we're faced with a two percent budget,
19 and it's -- I can't even describe the
20 pain that we're going through right now.
21 (indiscernible) last night, part of our
22 superintendent's (indiscernible) meeting,
23 spoke for about a half hour in executive
24 session on budget. (Indiscernible) it's
25 not going to be pretty; it's going to be

1 devastating. It's going to have a
2 devastating negative impact
3 (indiscernible). I don't even want to
4 talk about it now, because most of it's
5 confidentialn

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: We're facing
7 it.

8 MR. REILLY: And you're facing the
9 same thingn I get it. This is the first
10 time that we have, if you want to
11 consider it a benefit, I don't consider
12 it a benefit, because as you just said,
13 when you take the health care benefits
14 and take them (indiscernible) -- it's
15 really another (indiscernible).

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No, no longern

17 MR. REILLY: Well, what is it? It's
18 really closer to four percent, three
19 (indiscernible) for our budget if we take
20 it outside the cap. We're still
21 struggling to find a way to keep that
22 number inside the two percent
23 (indiscernible) -- it's difficultn I
24 don't know if (indiscernible) the
25 commission has done that or notn Do you

1 normally keep it outside the cap, or
2 do --

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Under state
4 provisions, they've said that it's two
5 percent cap excluding the cost of pension
6 and health.

7 MR. REILLY: Correct.

8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: But if take it
9 out for us, without the reduction --
10 apples to apples, if you don't
11 (indiscernible) value (indiscernible)
12 valuen For us, it's (indiscernible)n.
13 The fact that we just lost 76 million
14 (indiscernible) have to be reallocated,
15 reabsorbedn

16 That pushes that up to
17 (indiscernible) arbitration with the
18 police department, but based on
19 (indiscernible) ordinary situation. So,
20 what your numbers have consider as well
21 is the reduction in (indiscernible)
22 that's going to make (indiscernible)
23 seventy-six million dollars less than
24 what you (indiscernible) adjust your
25 numbers.

1 MR. REILLY: Well, honestly,
2 Commissioner, I would love to sit down
3 with you before we finalize our budget
4 and talk about the tie-in with the solar
5 as welln I mean, we were supposed to
6 meet tomorrow night, myself, Mrs Cook
7 (ph.), who's the chair person of budget
8 and finance, (indiscernible) and Mr.
9 Zarra, but obviously, (indiscernible), so
10 I expect that meeting to be
11 (indiscernible). But I would love to
12 have you at the next meeting if you're
13 availablen I'll let you know when it is.
14 I'd love to sit down with you
15 (indiscernible).

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No, my concern
17 is where all the commissioners on the
18 board (indiscernible)n. We're trying to
19 figure out, because we get it alln
20 Right, so, whether it comes, whether a
21 county school or whatever
22 (indiscernible). My phone rings is
23 simply (indiscernible) is --

24 MR. REILLY: Of course.

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: -- taxesn

1 (Indiscernible) you know, and you can run
2 the full gambit. So, I am very
3 supportive of the fact that we absolutely
4 need a good school system, and we need to
5 be providing for our children for things
6 that they need.

7 So, technology is obviously a
8 significant part of the (indiscernible).
9 But we do have to face the realities
10 (indiscernible) productively. Because
11 all of what we're going to be doing here
12 is not even close to being able to
13 (indiscernible), what will happen on the
14 (indiscernible).

15 MR. REILLY: That's why we're here
16 questions?

17 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Anyone have any
18 questions? Thank you.

19 IN UNISON: Thank you.

20 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Is there anyone
21 else that would like to address the
22 board? I need a motion to adjourn.

23 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Motion
24 to adjourn.

25 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Second.

1 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner
2 Scarpelli?

3 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Aye.

We pick up all salt barrels.


