MADAM CLERK: Yes, this evening we have minutes for several meetings. And Mr. Hannon, the rent leveling attorney, and Mr. Kuchta, the board chairman, are here to propose some changes to the rent leveling ordinance.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Counselor, do you have anything? MR. GENITEMPO: Just slight executive, very brief. That's it.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: So let's turn it over to Mr. Hannon and Mr. Kuchta.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: All right.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Good evening, gentlemen.

MR. KUCHTA: Good evening, everyone. Thank you for having us. The Rent Leveling Board has been looking at the code that governs rents. And we've been -- we have two recommendations to the commissioners to change the code, the ordinance.

The first one deals with filing information that

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the current code requires that the rent board to held (ph) over later than February 15th with the commissioners. And the second one deals with a capital improvement search (indiscernible). I believe everyone's been given copies of what we are addressing.

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And the first one is the filing information.

Essentially, what we're, you know, recommending is that, instead of a detailed report, which is required by the current code, that we file a summary report with the commissioners where we stand with respect to compliance with the ordinance, which is primarily a five percent limit on increases on those apartments that are governed by the -- by the law. And then any other information which would be deemed appropriate for the commissioners to have, such as (indiscernible) vacancy rates or average rents on the apartments that we do cover. We can now do this because of the good work the I.T. department has done in inputting all of the rents that are -- reflect in the (indiscernible).

The second recommendation is to amend the rent control (indiscernible) code. Back in 2013, there was an -- an ordinance went through to change the process and the conditions for a hardship increase. At the time that that section was put into the code online, the -- and so, if you go online and see it, the portion that covered capital improvement surcharge was deleted unintentionally. It was

deleted unintentionally.

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So at this point in time, we would like to reintroduce that particular provision. And we were working on changing/modifying it to make it clearer how the process goes and to make those changes at this time. Essentially, the process parallels that for hardship increase as far what has to be submitted -- the timing of submission and (indiscernible) the fee for submitting it.

And then we also would recommend that the Section E that's currently in the -- in the code be (indiscernible) with F and apply to both capital improvement surcharge and the hardship increase. This is for an escrow account for the themes (ph) that we may have before (indiscernible). If you have any questions, we have (indiscernible).

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I have a question. And it's a question where I don't know if you have jurisdiction over this or not. This past summer, we were getting calls from primarily senior citizens where they have to wait sometimes ridiculous amounts of time for landlords to make repairs to certain things that could very well be affecting their health. I'll give you an example, two examples.

One is a couple of seniors called. Air conditioners completely broke. And it's very, very hot days. And the landlord said, "We're coming. We're coming." They don't show up for a week, a week-and-a-half.

Another one -- the rails -- you know, if you're walking down, you've got the handrail. One rail fell or something. It didn't work. The landlord's coming, coming. Doesn't show up 'til weeks later.

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This is a hardship for people that are disabled.

Do you have any jurisdiction --

MR. KUCHTA: The way the code works is that we are the last resort. In other words, they will come to us on those, and we will refer them to either the health department -- it's in that jurisdiction --

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Right.

MR. KUCHTA: -- or code enforcement if it's the railings or things of that nature and tell them to go there first. That is really who has primary jurisdiction. If there is no satisfaction received under the host (ph) organizations, then the code says they can go through us and we can try to (indiscernible). But not until -- it says the last resort.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: So we have to do a better job in getting the word out as to what the process is.

Okay? That's (indiscernible).

COMMISSIONER EVANS: See, I agree with

Commissioner Rogers. And I had a similar question. It

seems to me that before someone is granted a hardship

increase of some sort, an improving increase, that the board

should require a -- have them getting some approval or some
letter written from the health department, right, that says
they passed as well as the Code Enforcement Department,
they've been out there, and they physically looked at the
property, that what's being represented meets the
satisfactory requirements of our ordinances and our codes.

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MR. KUCHTA: I agree. And, in fact, that is part of the provisions in the proposed --

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, so I was just confused when you were saying we're the last resort.

MR. KUCHTA: Well, this is if there is a --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Indiscernible)?

MR. KUCHTA: Well, no, if I understood what you're saying is they're coming to us for a hardship increase or for a capital improvement increase. We will not grant that, unless code enforcement says everything is up to snuff in their (indiscernible) taxes are paid. That's part of (indiscernible).

COMMISSIONER EVANS: But I'm adding to that is very clearly is --

MR. KUCHTA: (Indiscernible) Commissioner Rogers is saying -- what I understand there is if it's on -- they have not applied for anything. It's just an ongoing --there's an issue in an apartment.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: But Commissioner Evans

brings up a good point. If it's an ongoing thing, then why
would we approve it anyway?

MR. KUCHTA: We would not -- we would not, if there are outstanding issues, code violations. We would not (indiscernible).

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. All I'm --

MR. KUCHTA: And that's written into the --

COMMISSIONER EVANS: -- suggesting is that the language, right, be clear enough and straight forward enough that basically says if you want any kind of increase, you better have maintained your property. It should meet our codes and our standards. We shouldn't have to have the resources of the town absorbed in going back for repeat visits.

We shouldn't have people in town saying I'm trying to get this resolved for months. I think you should strengthen that and not be basically the source of last resort. You should have the ability to listen to rental requests. I think you should be able to put landlords on notice that this is what we require.

And I think being more definitive about what you require before the board, whether it's a hardship increase, a regular increase, any kind of increase.

MR. KUCHTA: A regular -- with the regular, then

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1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Whatever it is --2. MR. KUCHTA: -- there's some teeth if you've got a 3 In the time that I've been on the county rent regular. 4 board, there's been one application for a hardship and one for (indiscernible). COMMISSIONER EVANS: Isn't there a provision that 21 22 says that's a health emergency? 23 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yeah. 2.4 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And that you have 48 hours,

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24 hours to respond to that?

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COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well, why don't we do this?

Okay? At least from what I could do now is when we get a complaint like that in the health department, we're going to cc a copy to you. Right? So you'll have at least something on record. I don't know who's coming to you or who's looking for what.

The other thing is the fear factor.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: And then the code office will do the same. That's a good idea.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yeah. But we -- the code office has been very responsive to anything that we -- I mean, within hours.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Absolutely.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: We don't have to wait at all. I mean, they're out there with the help. So -
COMMISSIONER EVANS: They don't wait. They don't wait.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: But the other thing is is the fear factor, especially our elderly. They're very afraid to call the landlord, believing that they're going to be thrown out, that they're going to be penalized somehow. So we have to, I think -- when I say we, you know, we collectively. That includes me.

Maybe somehow get the word out. Don't fear. You know, you're not going to be put out on the street. And --

You said I would like to see your 1999 property taxes bill. So what happened was I know I have them in my house somewhere. I couldn't exactly find them.

So I went to town hall last Thursday and made a -went to the tax assessor's office before 1 o'clock. couldn't give them to me. So I had to make an OPRA. So I did an OPRA. So I'm supposed to get them by Thursday.

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But what I did was I did find my 2003 property tax

MR. ODRIA: All right. Well, I'll do it for you. That's 130.6 percent higher. That's 130.6 percent higher, my property taxes, since 2003.

Now, as of 2003, my home was 70 years old. And in 70 years of the life of my home, my house -- my house's real property taxes was \$5,180. Now, 13 years later, it just went up so dramatically. And I know you -- the only reason why I'm asking either question is because you're the director of finance. If Tucci was director of Finance, I would be addressing it to him.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: (Inaudible) question is very broad (inaudible) taxes went up. My taxes (inaudible) at some very high level, \$50,000. Obviously, your taxes (inaudible). The question is what portion of your taxes (inaudible).

What portion of your taxes (inaudible). What portion of your tax increase related (inaudible) property when the taxes were valued and those reassessments were applied in (inaudible). What factors contributed (inaudible) such as the age and the cost of tipping fees related to (inaudible) federal law changes (inaudible).

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How much of the cost increases (inaudible) subsequent bonding associated with (inaudible). How much of those costs (inaudible). There are a whole list of things (inaudible) bored into this (inaudible) saying my taxes have just gone (inaudible). Because your taxes have gone up.

(Inaudible) this board together collectively works very hard (inaudible) abide by the caps as best we can. We have yet to (inaudible) 2 percent levy tax. (Inaudible) very diligent about saying that. (Inaudible) comment on that at all. What you say simply is I live in town and my taxes have gone up.

I would be happy to answer your question. I would ask you, though, to be specific about what particular part of your tax (inaudible).

MR. ODRIA: All three of them, county, municipal, and the school.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I would encourage you to go to the County Board of Freeholders meeting and ask them why their taxes are going up. I encourage you to go to the

school board meetings and ask them why their taxes have gone up. (Indiscernible) I will tell you that the basic cost of services (inaudible) healthcare related to pension, related to (indiscernible) removal, as well as environmental factors as well as the implications associated with the (indiscernible) a range of increases (indiscernible) that have impacted taxpayers (indiscernible) differently.

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In your case, you have had (indiscernible)
probably in 2006 of that increase (inaudible) all from
looking at your taxes (inaudible) about \$3,000 of
(indiscernible), which (inaudible) related to a change in
the (inaudible) you are open to, as every citizen is in
Nutley to appeal it before the Essex County Tax Board.

MR. ODRIA: And I have, and they threw it back in my -- they just said no.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: They agreed with the township (inaudible). So there's a fairness (indiscernible) that you, along with everybody else (inaudible) which is how the revaluation (indiscernible) to begin with. You exercise your right as a taxpayer and (indiscernible) to go before (inaudible) know that. Then you're complying with what you need to do (inaudible).

Our job here is to continue to find ways we will manage our costs. You and everybody in town that we are relentless and (inaudible) broad implications associated

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with that. (Indiscernible) that says historically (inaudible) fundamentally (inaudible).

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There are questions that I think (inaudible) broadly to the residents of (inaudible). What type of town do we want (indiscernible). The commissioners talk about this all the time collectively as a board, not just department heads, but collectively as a board thinking about this as historically, how do we look at the history of our town.

What brought us to this point (inaudible) page of our life cycle (inaudible). What we're going to do is respect that history and, two, advance the life cycle of that history based on (inaudible). There is so much that is unbundled by your question that simply says my taxes went up 130 percent. That's why I'm confused.

Because to answer your question -- it's a very complex question. And I'd be happy to address what the municipal piece of that is. But I encourage you and every resident in town to go before the county, to go before the school board and ask them why those costs, their school board costs cost as much as they do.

MR. ODRIA: Well, what I would suggest is this. First of all, it seems like there's no end to these property taxes going up. And the other thing is if you want to control the school system and not overburden it, we should

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Let me finish.

MR. ODRIA: Sorry.

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within our constitution of this country, of this town that suggests that we can prevent somebody from occupying a residence simply because they have children and they may not — they may add children to our school system. The burden on our town is more related to the fact is that we have single-family homes, two-family homes which are empty nester homes where those people are now reaching a point where they say I want to change my lifestyle. And they're turning that home over to a young family. Are you suggesting that those homeowners cannot sell their home to a young family?

MR. ODRIA: Well, for the homeowners, I speak -maybe the reason why they're getting out is because they
just can't afford it any more. They're just getting
burdened. The water tax, the property taxes -- people don't
want to leave Nutley. I don't want to leave Nutley.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, that's (indiscernible).

MR. ODRIA: You know, I want to live here, but I don't want to be taxed to the point where I'm going to be in poverty as a middle -- I'm barely hanging on to middle class. What's going on is the middle class in this town and in this county, but more in this town, is being taxed into poverty. And they have to get out.

You know, people don't want to leave. I mean, people that I speak to that moved out -- they didn't want to leave. They couldn't afford it.

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COMMISSIONER EVANS: I want you to know I fully appreciate the fact that people are being pressured and burdened, right, because of the fees and costs, taxes, whatever services, excise taxes, property taxes, whatever you want to name. People -- income taxes -- they're overburdened with that. I agree with you, right? And I think there's not a member of this board that wouldn't agree that we have to find a way to figure out a way to do things in such a way that manages that tax burden.

Your point has been heard. It's been heard many times. Fundamentally, some of the things that affect your property tax bill, right, are significantly challenging in order to create a substantial change in your tax bill. A million dollar reduction in spending affects your tax bill \$25 a guarter.

Has your life improved by \$25 a quarter? I would say maybe. It would get you a free dinner. But the fact is in order to change the dynamic, right, the wholesale change of what you are suggesting about your taxes -- to, in effect, suggest that we could roll back taxes from 2016 on your property \$11,900 a year to where they were prevaluation to \$5,000 -- in order to reduce your taxes by that

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1	amount, we've got to reduce the tax levy by almost \$60
2	million. Levy is about \$109 million. The significance of
3	that is extraordinary.
4	MR. ODRIA: Well, respectfully, the bottom line
5	MAYOR SCARPELLI: Michael, Michael, Michael,
6	MR. ODRIA: is the reason why we're no, it's
7	because you guys (indiscernible).
8	MAYOR SCARPELLI: Michael, you're
9	MR. ODRIA: I know there's other things you've got
10	to (indiscernible)
11	MAYOR SCARPELLI: Michael, this is not a debate.
12	You made your point. Your time is up. It's time for
13	somebody else to come up to the mic.
14	MR. ODRIA: All right. I'll still bring you the
15	1999 when the clerk's office gives me my OPRA.
16	MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
17	address the board of commissioners?
18	MS. LANDRY: Pennie Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive. I'd
19	just like to add, Commissioner Evans, to the two percent cap.
20	Since I've owned my home, every year an ordinance or a
21	resolution has been passed to exceed the cap. So we have
22	actually maybe stayed within what is allowable under the

24	But there are many, many things that the law
25	states that can be over two percent, which, if I go back for

the six years that I've owned my home, every year an ordinance has been passed to exceed the two percent to allow for those exceptions. And I don't need an answer to that.

I would just like to point that out.

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My issue here in public comment is in July 2016, Clifton Councilman Colidez something was quoted in northjersey.com as saying that the bulk of residential development will occur on Nutley portion of the Roche site and that Clifton will only consider residential if it doesn't impact schools, police, et cetera, for Clifton residents. I called Prism today, because at their presentation that they did here, they said that they would have a website for the Nutley citizens to give input and that they would also be doing some town hall meetings for input, which, to your point, Commissioner Evans, about the issues of taxation, could be addressed asking the townspeople what they were willing to give up a little better or where they were willing to.

However, in the six years I've been here, I have not been invited to a town hall meeting to discuss taxes. And I just respectfully ask that you do and that maybe we could tie it into one of the Roche town hall meetings that their representatives said they would be getting back with me about the address for the website for citizens as well as, you know, for the dates of these public forums. So I

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guess the question is do we have a citizen or a person liaison with Prism that is in charge of communications or a P.R. person or something at the township level who can act as the point of contact for the Roche redevelopment.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I don't understand your question, Ms. Landry. Could you repeat it?

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MS. LANDRY: Do we have someone who is the designated person who is communicating with the LLC under Prism to communicate what is going on to the citizens of Nutley?

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Well, when it gets to that point, I'm sure they're going to offer that up to the citizens of Nutley. And the point of contact will probably be, as it has been all along, Mr. Genitempo.

MS. LANDRY: Okay, great. So I just direct things to Mr. Genitempo?

And I have a request attached to that. I attend a lot of planning board meetings, because I'm concerned about the future planning of our town. Last year, our chairman, Mr. McGovern, was absent or excused for 40 to 50 percent of the meetings. I have that exact number at home. I forgot to write it down.

This year so far, Chairman McGovern has missed 50 percent of the planning board meeting. Now, I was unable to locate anywhere in the code if there was a criteria for

members attending meetings once they are appointed by the mayor. In the event that there is something that's hidden in the code. I was unable to locate.

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If Chairman McGovern is not going to be able to chair the planning board meetings, which are critical right now, especially in light of Roche and changes that are being made and new developments being added, I would like for you to respectfully consider a person who, as the appointee, or maybe when he is Mr. McGovern is excused. There is someone here who is actually in this room who has shown really a great desire to want to serve the Township of Nutley. And I would respectfully ask that you consider, as maybe co-chair or as interim chair for the planning board, John Kelly III.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Landry. I'll take that under advisement.

MS. LANDRY: Thank you.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Anyone else?

MR. MOORE: Rory Moore (ph), 462 Chestnut Street.

Mr. Scarpelli, after the last meeting, I had spoke to you briefly outside. I thought that Mr. Rogers' behavior last time was reprehensible where he challenged anyone to appear before the board saying could we do a better job.

And I spoke to you, and I expected to at least have enough time to address that issue. But if you --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: You know, Mr. Moore, I -- after

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1 | I spoke to you, I reviewed --

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2 MR. MOORE: You said you were going to look at it.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: And I didn't take it the same way you took it.

MR. MOORE: Well, I did.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I think Mr. -- I think -- and I'm not going to speak for the commissioner. But I think he challenged people to find another town that works as well as ours does. And I think that's what he said. And I think you may have taken it the wrong way.

MR. MOORE: To say something -- the fear of death is only second to public speaking. When somebody has to come up here and address the commissioners, especially in complaint mode -- taxes are too high, whatever -- that's devastating to a lot of people. They're afraid to (indiscernible).

You should at least -- great opportunity for the board to understand that when people come here, it's not adversarial. They're addressing you, because somewhere along the line, the process below it didn't work. And I'll give you an example.

You have a three-minute rule for agenda items.

But yet, downstairs when you first come in, there's

different sets of agendas. You have one for the newspapers

and one for the public. I can understand that printing

because of trees. I'm into that.

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But you should have at least provide the public with the same information that the newspapers are receiving. I'm going to stand here for three minutes, and I have to formulate a question in less than 30 minutes, I should at least be able to see the documents. We don't.

If you wanted to look at the billables, the payables that you guys authorized, I have to look down to the board and make a determination that I have a few minutes to (indiscernible). Last meeting, Mr. Evans cited to Moody's, which I nicely got two days after the fact. He also cited the best practices. I got a copy two days after the fact.

But when you read the papers -- and I hear how great this was -- Moody's is based on \$124,000 a year average income for Nutley. Nationwide, it was 58. And the state of New Jersey was 85. If 85 was applied to this, the numbers would have changed. They would have changed.

It's the taxpayers that earn a lot of money that help you to do that. In your best practices -- speaking to the gentleman -- mandated by law, not because you guys came up with a really good idea. All your health benefits, the township website, how things are paid for contractors are by law. They're not done because you guys are doing a great job.

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And I think it was reprehensible to challenge everybody to do a better job, to find a better -- there is.

Under LOSAP, under the volunteer --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Direct your remarks to the mayor, please. That's the protocol. Thank you.

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MR. MOORE: Under the volunteer firemen, Paul Cafone (ph) has, by law, LOSAP, Length of Service Award Programs, has decided he wasn't going to pay the firemen the owed amount of money. Fine.

ALAN GENITEMPO: (Indiscernible).

MR. MOORE: Well, that is absolutely 100 --

ALAN GENITEMPO: Excuse me. That is 100 percent untrue. And I've been in the meetings regarding the LOSAP, and you are 100 percent wrong.

MR. MOORE: Then you should tell --

ALAN GENITEMPO: I don't know where you're getting your information from, but you're wrong.

MR. MOORE: Then you should tell the firemen that, because they were told that they're not getting the full amount. Now, that's mandated by law.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mr. Cafone -- Chief Cafone has been working with the volunteers to develop an easier way for them to earn the credits to get the LOSAP payments, not the other way around.

MR. MOORE: It's by law.

ALAN GENITEMPO: And you're -- no, it isn't
by law.

MR. MOORE: Yes, it is.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mr. Moore, please.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mr. Moore, please.

MR. MOORE: Would you like to see the program?

ALAN GENITEMPO: I know what the law is on
this issue. I've studied it, and I've read it. And you're

100 percent wrong. So don't mischaracterize what Chief
Cafone is doing, please.

MR. MOORE: Then you could say emphatically tonight that all of the volunteer firemen are going to receive the full amount for the LOSAP, according to state law? That's emphatic?

MR. MOORE: No, I do.

ALAN GENITEMPO: It's set up by ordinance, and it's set up by our ordinance. Each town has its own separate ordinance to qualify for LOSAP. The volunteers did not keep their records clear enough to enable themselves to get paid. Chief Cafone had nothing to do with it. So get your facts straight. I'll be happy to explain it to you.

MR. MOORE: Be my guest.

23 ALAN GENITEMPO: But not in this public

24 forum.

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MR. MOORE: All right. Be emphatic that right

now, the volunteer firemen are going to receive (indiscernible).

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ALAN GENITEMPO: (Indiscernible) wrong.

MR. MOORE: And I can understand that. And also potential litigation -- because Mr. Cafone hired a relative, which I asked for an OPRA which (indiscernible). And there is a potential litigation for that. But don't tell everybody up here you're doing a bang up job, this is really great that you're doing this. And everything that you're doing is mandated by law. You should at least be honest enough to say that when somebody gets up here because his taxes went up, he's concerned.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Indiscernible).

MR. MOORE: Yes, it's the mayor's (inaudible). When you look at this document, it's very clear that the citizens of Nutley worked very hard and very diligently to make a lot of money so you guys can tax it. You should at least be diligent and allow people to stand here and explain that to you. They might not be happy with your services.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mr. Moore.

Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners?

MR. ALESSIO: Carmine Alessio, 81 East Centre Street. Yeah, a couple of weeks ago, I was here. I was speaking with Mr. Rogers, and he had spoken about pest

control and animal cruelty. Okay. So I watched what, you know, unraveled on the cable TV again. And totally into the climax of what, you know he was saying and what I was going to reciprocate in saying. The TV went boom, shut off right at the main punch line during the climax, as I just said.

So the following day, I went down to the Parks

Department on Mauro Tucci, Commissioner. His advice -- if

you have any questions, go down to the Parks Department,

which I did. So I went down there, and I spoke to

Mr. DeMaio. And we had a nice little conversation. And he

looked into it, and he got it straightened out to where the

film completely went through.

The matinee one during the morning was good. The one in the evening went boom, and it cut off at the same spot a couple of times. So it managed to work for a day or so. Then a day later, boom, it went out. I went down to the Parks Department three times. So without me being interrupted now, at the end of my five minutes, if you have any questions or any answers to give me, I'd appreciate it.

In reference to Commissioner's Tucci's number 263-16, the microphone system, is the video system going to be included with that? That's one of my questions.

But what I mainly came here to address was the animals that were undermining my garage and being infested with mosquitoes and living next door to an empty lot, which

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happens to be 75 East Centre Street. And the Cafones own it. It's an empty lot. It's on the -- down at the tax assessor listed as an empty lot. But yet, it's being rented out as a transit station for different contractors going in and out of there and parking their vehicles.

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Very high volume, very maxed out with trailers all over the place. Okay? So I took it upon myself. In my opinion, okay, this activity violates C.55:19-82, determination of a property as a nuisance. And it also violates C.55:19-92, deemed (indiscernible) that the owner has failed to take action to further the revitalization of the property.

In a sense, that means that when he purchased the property, he didn't submit a site plan. It's being used as a seasonal use, and it's open 24 hours a day and where people from the park come all hours of the night and use it for parking, municipal-type lot. And this is going on right next door to me, along with all of the vermin that's there and going onto my property and being a nuisance to me.

At that, there's included in that, if you were to research the law, dumping of grass, leaving it for a long period of time, stench, and everything else that goes along with being a nuisance. That's what that place is. The Nutley Code Officers do not enforce C.55:19-92, because the owner seems to be of special interest.
