2 MADAM CLERK: Board of Commissioners public
3 meeting, Tuesday, March 6th, 2018. The time is 7:04.
4 Pursuant to the requirements of the Open Public Meeting Act
5 (Chapter 231, Public Law 1975), notice of this meeting was
6 published in the December 14th, 2017 issues of The Nutley
7 Sun, the Herald News, and the Star Ledger. A copy of this
8 notice has been posted on the Nutley Town Hall bulletin
9 board and a copy is on file in the Municipal Clerk's Office.

10 Commissioner Rogers?

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Here.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci is
13 absent/excused.

14 Commissioner Evans?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Here.

18 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Here.

20 MADAM CLERK: All present, Mayor, except for
21 Commissioner Tucci. He is absent/excused this evening.

22 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Petracco, what do
23 you have on the agenda tonight?

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I believe I have an
25 ordinance introduction. That's regarding my TO. And I have

1 three resolutions. This is just property -- abandoned
2 property that we do all the time, appropriation reserves
3 from the Department of Public Safety Salary and Wages. I
4 think that's to the legal account. And a change order for
5 Scarinci and Hollenbeck for \$2100.

6 The account for legal is in your --

7 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Right.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: So we transferred money
9 into it from '17.

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Okay.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That helps. And that's
12 all I have.

13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Evans?

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have six resolutions, three
15 relate to our issuance of general obligation bonds and a
16 bond anticipation notice. And then refund of overpayment of
17 tax charges and return of escrow monies. That's all I have.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Rogers?

19 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I have one resolution
20 designating the month of March as National Women's History
21 Month. And that's it.

22 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Tucci just has a
23 Shade Tree report. And I don't have any resolutions. Madam
24 Clerk?

25 MADAM CLERK: We have no minutes. We have some

1 correspondence from Holy Family and one from Krank Gym. And
2 that's it.

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Counselor?

4 MR. GENITEMPO: I just want to report on a meeting
5 that I attended this morning that was a pre-construction
6 meeting for the site -- Prism site, actually for the medical
7 school. And they're moving along pretty well and we're
8 working with them on permits. They expect to have people on
9 site in April, early April, with temporary parking in the
10 back while they continue to build their parking lots. And
11 then June 2nd is when they expect the first students to be
12 on site. By then, the roadways and the parking lot should
13 be complete.

14 So the Town is working well with them and with the
15 engineers. The county was here, people from the county. So
16 we had a good meeting.

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: How many people you said were in
18 that meeting?

19 MR. GENITEMPO: There were 18 people at the
20 meeting. So -- but it was a good meeting and we got a good
21 feel for the project progressing schedule. They're going to
22 provide a schedule soon for completion of the roadways and
23 the parking lot. They didn't have it for today, but they
24 hope to have it soon.

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And then for the April -- the

1 temporary parking that's going to be some space in Clifton.

2 MR. GENITEMPO: On the Clifton side with 700
3 spaces on the Clifton side. But it's going to be gradual as
4 people start to -- they start to move people over.

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: They can't do the paving on
6 the Nutley side until they come back before the Planning
7 Board.

8 MR. GENITEMPO: Right. They've got to come back
9 to the Planning Board, get their final approval, at which
10 point they'll pave and then we'll give them their
11 COO.

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I wanted to ask you about
13 that too because I don't know who asked me that question
14 today or where I saw it, but that -- we -- they're not able
15 to -- because I went to the meeting, the Mayor and I, and I
16 know you were there last night, Alan, too, at the Roche
17 meeting. But somebody said to me they can't pave that lot
18 until the Commissioners vote on it?

19 MR. GENITEMPO: No, I mean, it's really the
20 Planning Board's final approval of the application for that.
21 We've made it a condition, certain things condition before
22 we approve of that paving.

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: What they do need to come back
24 with is a signed amendment to the redevelopment agreement.

25 MR. GENITEMPO: Right.

1 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Before the Planning Board will
2 approve that.

3 MR. GENITEMPO: Correct. So the overall --

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: So it does -- I guess we're
5 involved somewhere along the line.

6 MR. GENITEMPO: Right. The overall --

7 MAYOR SCARPELLI: We already signed the agreement,
8 they haven't.

9 MR. GENITEMPO: -- The overall for the other
10 parking that we've already been going through changes that
11 redevelopment agreement. They haven't -- it has to be
12 signed by them before we give them final approval. So
13 there's a lot of things that have to happen.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And just for the record --

15 MR. GENITEMPO: Sure.

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- and we're on the record
17 tonight, you know, that meeting that we all attended,
18 obviously there's three components: work, live, and play.
19 So it's obvious that I would urge all Nutley residents to
20 get out and go to these meetings because there's -- from
21 what I took of it is that one doesn't work without the
22 others. So if you're going to have a good, productive site
23 without the residential component, you're not going to have
24 it.

25 And you know, there's a lot of moving parts to

1 that, which we all know, but I think that was the beginning
2 of Gene Diaz, principal owner of Prism, to get his message
3 out that that's the direction that they're moving in. And I
4 don't know that I'm -- until I get all of that information,
5 I don't know that I'm so much on board with that.

6 MR. GENITEMPO: But I think that's the message
7 he's already -- he's been scouting for a long time. But he
8 wants the public to start to hear his message more than just
9 us, so that was the first step, I guess. The next one is
10 Thursday.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And I have to say, that
12 speaker was excellent that he did have there.

13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: He was funny.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Funny, yeah.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: He had some good lines.

16 Anything else?

17 MR. GENITEMPO: That's it.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Let's go -- maybe we can get
19 home before the state of emergency.

20 MR. GENITEMPO: 8 o'clock. State of emergency.

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Madam Clerk?

24 MADAM CLERK: Thank you, Mayor. Board of
25 Commissioners public meeting, Tuesday, March 6, 2018. The

1 time is 7:13.

9 Commissioner Rogers?

10 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Here.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci is
12 absent/excused.

13 Commissioner Evans?

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

15 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Here.

17 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Here.

19 MADAM CLERK: All present, Mayor, except for
20 Commissioner Tucci. He is absent/excused this evening.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Can we have a moment of silence
22 for Senator/Commissioner Orechio and Alan Genitempo's dad.

23 We had a moment of silence before our workshop meeting, but
24 this is our first regular meeting. So please just take a

25 moment.

1 (Pause)

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Mr. Mayor, can I make a
4 comment about Mayor Orechio?

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Sure.

6 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: For those of you who never
7 had the opportunity to meet Mayor Orechio, he is the epitome
8 of an individual who really loved this Town. The guy, he
9 was enacted Governor once. He was the Senate president.
10 But I remember the years being here. He always put Nutley
11 first, always did.

12 And if there was a bill in the Senate, if there
13 was something going on statewide, he would make sure that
14 this Township would be taken care of. So for those -- you
15 know, I was thinking of this the other day. It's kind of
16 sad that we have children growing up in Town who never will
17 have the opportunity to meet a real gentleman. I mean,
18 there's not a bad word you could say about this guy, a real
19 gentleman, who always treated people with respect, and with
20 honor and dignity.

21 But I think -- I just wanted to put on the record
22 what I just said. He was certainly an inspiration to me and
23 helped me when I became a police officer here. But boy is
24 he dearly missed and hopefully down the road we see another
25 gentleman like him come up and run for office and maybe one

1 day get elected.

2 Thank you, Mayor.

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And I would add that he had a
4 passion for veterans, but especially young adults and anyone
5 that actually was in need. You know, whatever he could do,
6 he was always there.

7 And I agree with you that he was an outstanding
8 and strong advocate for Nutley all the time.

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I'm going to actually --
10 thank you, Commissioner. I'm going to actually read
11 something that I posted the day I attended the funeral. I
12 posted this on Facebook about Carmen Orechio.

13 "Today was a very sad day for Nutley. Saying
14 goodbye for such an icon was difficult, especially for me,
15 the person who took over public safety after Carmen Orechio.
16 Being Carmen's mother's paperboy when I was 10 years old was
17 when I first met him. He helped so many, including me. He
18 was a true statesman and loved the Town and I was proud to
19 know him. One day in my second term as Mayor, I ran into
20 Carmen at a wake and shook his -- he shook my hand. He held
21 onto it a longer and said to me, 'You're doing a good job,
22 kid.' His approval meant everything to me.

23 Today, at the cemetery, one of Carmen's lifelong
24 friends shook my hand and said, 'You remind me a lot of
25 Carmen.' That was a huge compliment to me. In closing, I

1 will let Carmen's spirit guide me in public safety. Nutley
2 was very lucky to have a Carmen Orechio look out for all of
3 us for so many years. And I was always proud to call him my
4 friend. God bless him. May he rest in peace."

5 Thank you.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner.

7 I've known Commissioner/Mayor/and Senator Orechio
8 probably my whole life, either when my grandfather was
9 running four times for -- to be seated up here and not
10 winning, or when my father was here for 25 years sitting
11 next to him.

12 So he's going to be missed. He was an icon,
13 statewide, not only here. And as everybody said, he always
14 put Nutley first. And I talked to Commissioner Tucci and
15 although the Senator didn't want anything named after him,
16 Commissioner Tucci is going to look for the appropriate
17 place for something to be named after him. So --

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Indiscernible).

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Yes, but that's not ours. Yes,
20 sir. So Commissioner Tucci is going to be taking care of
21 that.

22 So, Madam Clerk, communications?

23 MADAM CLERK: Yes, thank you, Mayor. We have four
24 event applications, three of which are for Holy Family.

25 Holy Family Church has submitted an event

1 application requesting permission to hold their 27th Annual
2 Italian Festival on Thursday, September 20, 2018 through
3 Sunday, September 23, 2018 at their property located at 28
4 Brookline Avenue.

5 They've also submitted an event application for a
6 Palm Sunday procession on March 25, 2018 from 11:15 to 11:50
7 starting at 174 Franklin Avenue and ending at 28 Brookline
8 Avenue.

9 They've also requested permission to utilize
10 Yanticaw Park near Park Drive for a community prayer
11 gathering for five consecutive Sundays, starting April 8
12 through May 6, 2018 from 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM.

13 And the last event is from Krank Gym from Nutley
14 has submitted an application requesting to hold a Memorial
15 Fundraiser Run on May 5th from 12:00 PM to 1:30 PM starting
16 and finishing at Krank Gym on 55 Washington Avenue.

17 I need a motion, please.

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Move it.

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

21 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

22 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

3 MADAM CLERK: And that's it.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Tucci has a Shade
5 Tree report that's been submitted.

6 Bills, Madam Clerk?

7 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor. Bill list for March 6,
8 2018. Public affairs, \$91,379.41; Revenue & finance,
9 \$2,525,105.47; Public safety, \$89,152.86; Public works,
10 \$416,321.94; Parks and public property, \$951,150.27. Water
11 utility, \$85,794.69. Total payroll \$917,185.14. For a
12 grand total of \$5,076,089.78.

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Move the bills.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

15 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

16 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

17 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

19 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

21 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

22 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

23 MADAM CLERK: And that's it for bills, Mayor.

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public comment on agenda items
25 only. Madam Clerk.

1 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor.

2 All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners
3 regarding community concerns should approach the microphone
4 and provide their name and address for the record. Unless
5 further time is granted by the Board, each person shall
6 limit their address to three minutes. All remarks to the
7 Board and its individual members must be addressed to the
8 Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the
9 appropriate member of the Board. Dialogue between citizens
10 and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the
11 Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the
12 membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest
13 of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal
14 business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address
16 the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

17 Seeing none, let's move on to the Board of
18 Commissioner announcements. Commissioners?

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I'm good.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I do have a comment
21 tonight, Mayor. You know, Tom Evans being the tax guy, he
22 doesn't really -- there's nothing I could really ever
23 compliment him on. And I don't want to say too much about
24 what I did with somebody Tom knows very closely.

25 But the chief and I have broadened our horizons on

1 some of these school issues. And I just want to -- I don't
2 want to say who or what, Commissioner, but I want to thank
3 you for setting that up and, you know, it was very
4 advantageous, the meeting, who you sent was a true gentleman
5 and he looks out for Nutley.

6 So not to get into the details, I just want to
7 publicly thank Commissioner Evans for setting that meeting
8 up with both the chief and I, and always looking out for the
9 Town.

10 Thank you, Tom.

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: You're welcome. Thank you.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: The only thing I want to say is
13 everybody stay safe tomorrow and tomorrow night. Keep the
14 cars off the road. Don't travel unless absolutely necessary
15 and everybody just get home safe tomorrow.

16 Ordinance introductions. Commissioner Petracco?

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes. Before I read this
18 ordinance introduction, this is to change my TO. And again,
19 I've had a chance to talk to everybody on the Board.

20 This is bringing a seventh lieutenant in, which I
21 really want to push into intelligence, and scrubbing through
22 computers, and set up a whole array of assignment about
23 events and what he does. And again, I'm very pleased from
24 the Mayor. I know Commissioner Tucci is not here, but all
25 the Board members for getting on board with this and really

1 investing in our children because this position is going to
2 work hand in hand with what has become these school threats,
3 you know, over the last few weeks.

4 So this is an ordinance to amend an ordinance
5 codified in the Township of Nutley Code, Chapter 131,
6 entitled Establishment and Organization of the Police
7 Department.

8 I move that this ordinance be passed through the
9 second reading and advertised in the Nutley Sun, together
10 with notice required by law and that further consideration
11 of said ordinance for final passage be, by the Board of
12 Commissioners, to be held at a second reading on --

13 MADAM CLERK: April 3rd.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: April 3rd, 2018. I move
15 the ordinance.

16 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

17 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Before I vote on this, I
19 want to explain a few things. I want to explain and
20 articulate the importance of what Commissioner Petracco is
21 doing.

22 This is a very proactive policing methodology that
23 I believe will certainly be a tremendous asset in the
24 addressing of some of the incidents we've seen around the
25 country, a very proactive asset. Back in the '80s, we had

1 community policing, '90s community policing. We had cops in
2 the schools. And the intelligence gathering and information
3 gathering was profound.

4 This police department was able to, in a very good
5 way, curb a lot of drug abuse and proliferation of drugs in
6 this Town just by having cops in the schools. This
7 intelligence bureau that he's going to set up, I understand
8 will not only be scrubbing social media and hopefully
9 gathering information, but it's no secret, Commissioner,
10 that I've been a very strong proponent of police officers in
11 the schools.

12 Our first line of defense against anyone who dares
13 to come into a school and harm anyone is a person who is
14 well trained in firearms. And that well trained person
15 could be a retired police officer or military person, but we
16 have to emphasize well trained. And they don't have to be
17 uniformed officers.

18 Back in the '70s, and '80s, and '90s, we did not
19 have uniformed officers in the schools. They went in plain
20 clothes. And we've talked about this, Commissioner.

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We have.

22 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: And they have -- they've had
23 -- they created a wonderful relationship with children
24 throughout the school district. We don't want kids running
25 from our schools. We don't want them running out of the

1 schools for safety. We want them running into the schools
2 for safety. And when you have police officers who are
3 trained, and going down the road that Commissioner Petracco
4 is going in intelligence gathering and information
5 collection, that doesn't mean that the officers are going to
6 be grilling kids and dragging information out of them. It
7 means that these well trained officers, when he sets up this
8 unit, are going to become friends with young people in the
9 school district.

10 And those kids are going to know that they could
11 go to those officers and you may know this. Maybe some of
12 you don't know this, but there is a program called LEAD. I
13 already know that there are officers in those schools where
14 kids want them to come in. They're befriending them.

15 And let me add this too about the whole mental
16 health issues and many of the problems that related to the
17 incidents we're seeing, other than the gun issue. That's a
18 federal issue. We shouldn't be involved in that.

19 But when we talk about mental health and we talk
20 about children in need, we're talking about some serious
21 business. We're talking about, and this is where your cops
22 come in and the intelligence and information gathering
23 aspect of it. We're talking about children that are living
24 in broken homes. We're talking about children who are
25 living in situations where domestic violence has become a

1 way of life. We're talking about children who need a
2 friend. And boy, if that child can see in that officer a
3 friend, then that officer could bring the information that's
4 needed to the school district, and to law enforcement
5 authorities to do what must be done to treat that child.

6 I saw it for myself in the '80s. There used to be
7 a kid stoplight at juvenile bureau every day to show us his
8 homework. He didn't have a father. He had a father, but
9 the father didn't care. But because of the community
10 policing aspects and what you're going to be doing now,
11 you're going to see a life saved and maybe redirected to
12 something so important to our society.

13 So I fully support this. I like the idea that
14 you're building a framework, especially looking into social
15 media, but your biggest asset are going to be those young
16 kids who are going to come to those offices and say you
17 know, I've got a bad feeling about so and so, could you guys
18 look into it.

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Very true.

20 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: So I fully support this and
21 I vote yes.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you.

23 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I'm going to speak to your
25 comments before I vote, which I would vote yes.

1 Everything I've learned in a very short period of
2 time says that one, security for our schools, and even for
3 the community, is a network and it's an umbrella of
4 overlapping layers of things that you put in place. It's
5 not one thing that you do that makes it right.

6 And not any one thing you do or even the umbrella
7 is 100 percent. But what I have learned is what you're
8 speaking towards was anything that can be done, whether it's
9 a police officer, a psychologist, a counselor, you know,
10 that you have that can do the early identification before it
11 becomes the threat, which then creates chaos. And even like
12 -- you know, when you think about it, right, one police
13 officer in the school and you have a gun situation, it
14 becomes extreme chaos, right?

15 The level of training that's required that says if
16 that officer has to pull his weapon, how confident is he
17 that if he does pull it, he's going to hit his target. And
18 the training that's required and the regular use of that
19 training to make sure that when he pulls his weapon, he can
20 guide it to where it needs to go. Because the risk is, you
21 then have, in effect, friendly fire that could hurt someone.

22 So I think that's a very delicate issue that has
23 to be addressed. But I think the point you were raising
24 wasn't the chaotic thread, it was the early identification.
25 And getting -- whatever it is, whatever level, is that

1 voice. And Nutley -- to Nutley's credit, unlike Parkland
2 where there were 30 calls to the local sheriff's office of a
3 child who was in an alternate school system, four calls to
4 the FBI, and nothing happened.

5 In Nutley, one call and that's all it took to
6 basically exercise the forces that we have in play and get
7 people to act. And I think that's to the credit of the Town
8 and to public safety, and the dedication of the officers
9 where a child speaks to the parent. The parent calls. And
10 there's no question about. There's action.

11 And I think that's part of -- again, I think it's
12 another layer of the security umbrella that says our police
13 station is in close proximity to the schools. We can
14 respond very quickly. But when we get notice of something,
15 we don't ignore it. We act. And I think that's an
16 important part of, you know, figuring this all out.

17 But I like your point about how do you put things
18 in place, which isn't about the pinnacle of where there's a
19 threat and it's active, where there's chaos. It's about how
20 you do the early identification to avoid that level. And I
21 think that's very appropriate.

22 So absolutely yes.

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I vote yes.

1 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Mayor, before we just move
4 on, I just -- first of all, I would like to thank the Board.
5 And it's the word that I've been preaching about this
6 ordinance. And it really means a lot the full support of
7 the Board on something like this is the prevention.

8 You know, and I have to tell you, Captain Greene,
9 I saw him walk in. He's our captain that oversees the
10 detective bureau. And I don't want to get into how many
11 threats we've had and how many things they've been looking
12 into, but it definitely stresses out your agencies. You
13 know, and not that one person is needed because when there's
14 nothing going on as I always said, you know, it's -- you
15 could do without a lot. But it's never a problem until it's
16 a problem.

17 And you know what, we've had some problems in
18 Nutley. And to me, it's all about prevention. But at the
19 last commission meeting, I did mention what a great job the
20 parents did, the kids did, our superintendent did, the
21 School Board did, of seeing something and saying something.
22 And that's the biggest message that we could ever put out
23 there because we cannot defend from it.

24 A lot of communities are -- they're great at
25 responding and Nutley has a great response time. We have

1 the ESU team which a lot of towns come to train
2 with our guys. That's how far ahead of the curve we are.
3 But it's about prevention and that's what I'm trying to
4 accomplish with all of your help.

5 So I appreciate the vote. And I know that I had a
6 couple of kind words to say for Captain Greene in the back,
7 but now that he's here, I'll do that in person.

8 I have to tell you, this guy, along with the chief
9 and all of the detectives, they work 24 hours a day, 7 days
10 a week. That's during the school threat. And I know I've
11 mentioned that before. But I'd just like to stand up and
12 give Jerry a round of applause. And not just for you,
13 Captain, but for all of your men that -- you guys did a
14 great job and we'll never know what you prevented here in
15 Nutley and we appreciate it.

16 Thank you, Mayor.

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Resolutions. Commissioner
18 Rogers.

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No raises, by the way, right?

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Excuse me?

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No raises, right?

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No. Actually, Captain is
23 here on his own time, Tom.

24 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Resolution number 67-18.

25 Whereas, in 1988 the month of March was designated

1 by the United States Congress as "National Women's History
2 Month"; and

3 Whereas, Women's History Month promotes the
4 teaching of women's history and the achievements of women
5 throughout the world; and

6 Whereas, it is important for the residents of the
7 township to recognize the growing contributions and
8 achievements of women in the Township of Nutley, State of
9 New Jersey;

10 Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Board of
11 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley calls upon all
12 citizens of Nutley to observe the month of March as:
13 National Women's History Month 2018. "Nevertheless she
14 persisted" is a quote honoring women who fight all forms of
15 discrimination against women -- at which time all of the
16 residents may join in commemorating women, past and present,
17 who have rendered a service to our nation, our state and our
18 township.

19 Also, therefore be it resolved, that the Board of
20 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley calls upon all
21 citizens of Nutley to observe International Women's Day,
22 Thursday, March 8th, a global day celebrating the economic,
23 political, and social achievements of women past, present,
24 and future since 1911.

25 Before I move this resolution, we've had

1 outstanding women in this Town. I remember we found two
2 World War II veterans, women. Imagine in World War II, they
3 achieved the rank of Admiral. One of them we have her -- a
4 plaque dedicated to her in our office. She was a nurse in
5 the United States Navy during World War II.

6 We had one who was a grand marshal of a parade
7 here. God knows how many other women we have in this Town
8 that have made so many contributions to this country. But
9 I've always emphasized this, and I know I sound like a
10 broken record sometimes but for some reason lost in our
11 history books is the contributions of women to this country
12 during World War II. I didn't learn about that until it was
13 later in life. Where were our mothers, our grandmothers,
14 our fathers, our grandfathers -- or our grandmothers or
15 mothers, I should say, when dad was out fighting the war in
16 Europe?

17 They were in the factories. My mother was in the
18 Brooklyn Navy yard, in factories welding Jeeps and tanks.
19 So as we pass this resolution, I would hope that some
20 educators around the town and the country realize that maybe
21 we've got to put some more emphasis on the contributions of
22 women, especially for young girls today, because this is
23 history that should not be forgotten. And unfortunately, it
24 has been forgotten.

25 People ask me what's the sense of these

1 resolutions? Why do we have a resolution like this? To do
2 exactly what we're doing tonight, public awareness of lost
3 history. Public awareness of a history we should never,
4 never, never forget.

5 So I move this resolution.

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

15 Thank you, Commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Thank you.

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Evans?

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you. I have three
19 resolutions that are all related to the same item. In May,
20 we will be financing a new set of bonds for \$6,791,000 of
21 principal amount. We'll also be refinancing our bond
22 anticipation note, which will be a \$2,693,300.

23 The bond anticipation note will be for a period of
24 one year. It relates to the Ciccolini purchase, which was an
25 original purchase at \$3,425,000. But our bonding

1 related to that is down to \$2,693,300 because we've been
2 paying that down.

3 We don't have any bonding related to the purchase
4 of the building next to the bike shop because that building
5 has -- that purchase has been paid off. So we continue to
6 pay down our debt. The -- the reason for this is as we look
7 at the bonds, we periodically renew our bonds, generally
8 around a five year mark we'll go through that. And the
9 market is good timing.

10 We believe that we'll be able to get a bond that
11 will have an 11 year life and an interest rate that will be
12 below 3 percent. And given the timing of some of the
13 actions in the market and the focus of the federal reserve
14 where they might start to increase interest rates, we want
15 to take advantage of the bonding before that occurs, which
16 is most likely to occur later in the year. So the timing is
17 very good.

18 So I just will, you know, look at bond --
19 resolution number 58-18 relates to the bond anticipation
20 note in the amount of \$2,693,300. It will be for a period
21 not to exceed one year.

22 59-18 relates specifically to our bond -- a
23 bonding, which will be a note, as I said, which we believe
24 it will be 11 years, for \$6,791,000.

25 Overall, our debt service going forward will be

1 less annually because of the way we're managing through
2 this, will be lower by \$200,000. And actually in the fifth
3 year, it actually increases -- the benefit increases. So
4 we'll continue to do that.

5 What you'll find is that every year we have in our
6 capital management program, the Commissioners -- we
7 negotiate on what we need to spend money on, which as how do
8 we anticipate a large purchase of a fire truck or building
9 improvements. We spread that out. And so each year, we
10 manage to roughly one and a half million dollars' worth of
11 capital improvements.

12 We were able to fund that and then every --
13 roughly every five years, we renew the bonding. Overall,
14 from Nutley's position, we have a borrowing ceiling that is
15 over \$126 million. Our outstanding debt is roughly 12
16 percent of that. So we keep our debt very low and we manage
17 that, roughly to a nice sort of mortgage level, less than
18 three percent with maturity of 11 years. We try to stay
19 around that so that we can manage our way through that.

20 So very effectively, we're getting good rates,
21 short period of -- short intervals. We're not bonding for
22 20, 30 years. We keep it short and we manage our way
23 through that. And we control that all because of each year
24 we put a cap through our capital management plan. So number
25 59-18 is for the authorization to purchase bonds in the

1 amount of \$6,791,000.

2 The 60-18 specifically relates to the bonds
3 themselves for the same amount of \$6,791,000. So I move
4 resolutions together numbers 58-18, 59-18, and 60-18. So
5 moved.

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci -- sorry,
10 Commissioner Evans?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Be it resolved, by the Board
17 of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, in the County of
18 Essex, that the Treasurer be and she is hereby authorized to
19 refund overpayment of the property taxes in the amount of
20 \$7,888.05 for block 5900 lot 13, so moved.

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

22 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

23 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

3 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Be it resolved, by the Board
6 of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, in the County of
7 Essex, State of New Jersey, that the Treasurer be and she is
8 hereby authorized to refund overpayments of the tax charges
9 in the amount of \$14,115.18 as follows:

10 Block 3600, lot 25 for \$3,126.57;

11 Block 8700, lot 53 for \$2,216.65;

12 Block 5301, lot 1 for \$3,843.75;

13 Block 9000, lot 1, qualifying code C4085 for
14 \$3,044.09; and

15 Block 9000, lot 75 for \$1,884.12;

16 As I said, for a total of \$14,115.18.

17 So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

19 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

20 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

21 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

22 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

23 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

25 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

1 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Be it resolved, by the Board
3 of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, in the County of
4 Essex, State of New Jersey, that the Treasurer be and she is
5 hereby authorized to refund escrow monies for land use
6 applications in the amount of \$4,390 for 64-66 Franklin
7 Avenue, Trust account T-15-910-968 for \$1,000; and 180-184
8 Centre Street, Trust account T-15-910-859 for \$3,390. So
9 moved.

10 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

12 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

15 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

17 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you, Mayor.

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner.

21 Commissioner Petracco?

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes, I'll just read this
23 by title. This is some -- this is resolution number 68-18.

24 Whereas, the Township of Nutley has determined
25 that the property described on Schedule A attached hereto

1 and incorporated herein has been abandoned by its owners and
2 titled as junk, along with I -- standard title, cleared
3 through the Division of Motor Vehicle.

4 So this is for a few cars: a 2002 Ford, 2004
5 Honda, 2008 Mazda, and 2008 Toyota, and 2003 Chevy.

6 I move the resolution.

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Second.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

9 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Be it resolved, by the
17 Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of
18 Essex, State of New Jersey that in accordance with the
19 provision of R.S. 40A:40-59, the following transfers of 2017
20 Appropriation Reserves be and the same are hereby authorized
21 and approved:

22 From police salary and wage \$10,000 to police O/E
23 \$10,000. I move the resolution.

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Second.

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

2 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

7 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Whereas, the Township of
9 Nutley entered into a specialized professional services as a
10 non-fair and open contract, pursuant to the provision of
11 N.J.S.A. 19:44 A-20.5, with Scarinci and Hollenbeck, 1100
12 Valley Brook Avenue, Lyndhurst, New Jersey for the legal
13 services, on March 7th, 2017 via Resolution Number 64-17;
14 and

15 Whereas, the Director of the Department of Public
16 Safety has recommended the following change order from said
17 contract:

18 Change order number 1: Legal Services \$2,110.16.

19 Whereas, funds are available from Account No. 7-
20 01-308-205 and have been certified by the Chief Financial
21 Officer, said certification being attached to this
22 resolution;

23 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of
24 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,
25 State of New Jersey, that Change Order No. 1 in the amount

1 of \$2,110.96 be and is hereby approved.

2 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

3 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

5 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's all I have.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: That concludes the business
13 portion of our meeting. Madam Clerk?

14 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor.

15 All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners
16 regarding community concerns should approach the microphone
17 and provide their name and address for the record. Unless
18 further time is granted by the Board, each person shall
19 limit their address to five minutes. All remarks to the
20 Board and its individual members must be addressed to the
21 Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the
22 appropriate member of the board. Dialogue between citizens
23 and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the
24 Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the
25 membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest

1 of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal
2 business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address
4 the Board of Commissioners this evening?

5 MS. SOLENTO: Hello, Amy Solento. 70 Newman
6 Avenue.

7 I have a few questions, topics. First of all, the
8 State Department and Community Affairs just announced a
9 significant change in what they're requiring in terms of
10 building permits and inspections. Roofing, siding, indoor
11 plumbing, fixture replacement, indoor sheetrock and drywall,
12 and a few other things, alarm systems. They're no longer
13 requiring permits.

14 So I know this news is very recent. So I'm just
15 wondering, will there be a projection prepared in terms of
16 potential revenue loss, potential reduction of inspections?

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: We haven't done that yet
18 because it just came out. But we do have to look at what
19 the implication is because we're anticipating -- actually
20 anticipating more revenue for the code office this year.
21 And because of that change, we may have to reduce our
22 revenue expectation as a result. So the answer is we do
23 have to look at it, but it just came out. I haven't done
24 that yet.

25 MS. SOLENTO: Yeah, I understand. It just

1 happened. So I guess on the flip side it would be great to
2 have some consumer education about hiring a registered
3 contractor, how to make sure you're getting the best value
4 for your buck. And this may sound odd, but if there's going
5 to be a reduction in inspections, but we have qualified
6 people, can the Town offer a service that someone can say
7 I'm hiring an inspector to come out and inspect my job
8 before I pay the final payment to a contractor.

9 I mean, especially in the case of roofing. If a
10 contractor isn't reputable and they put a third layer on,
11 you know, it's a problem. So I don't know. Just thinking
12 of budgetary and revenue opportunities for the Town.

13 So I attended the joint meeting last week of the
14 Board of Commissioners, Planning Board, Zoning Board, Board
15 of Education. I thought it was very educational. It was
16 sort of a surprise about mixed use and density, how many
17 times it's been mentioned over the years, but there just
18 have been gaps.

19 So I believe there's a workshop scheduled for
20 tomorrow night, obviously pending snow.

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It was cancelled due to the
22 weather.

23 MS. SOLENTO: It is cancelled. So the next -- so
24 the workshop will take place at the next Planning Board
25 meeting?

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That would be Carol Tangora
2 (ph), but I assume that would be correct.

3 MS. SOLENTO: Okay. So my question is what will
4 be in place in terms of ensuring that there will be a
5 resolution, the workshop -- third workshop on mixed use and
6 density will actually result in recommendations between all
7 parties, including the building department, and that the
8 recommendations for policies will come to the Board of
9 Commissioners, how will that be ensured?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Well -- so in the Code
11 office, I've already given instructions that the differences
12 that have been identified must be resolved. And I don't
13 know if the meeting is still being held, but the meeting
14 between the Code office and the Committee of the Planning
15 Board was supposed to take place tomorrow morning at 8
16 o'clock because I didn't want it to -- I made it clear that
17 it can't linger.

18 So we will stay on top of that to make sure that
19 whatever those differences are -- whatever it takes to
20 resolve those differences and do it right, that will be done
21 between the Code office and the Planning Board. When that's
22 completed, that will be a resolution recommendation that
23 will come before the Board of Commissioners.

24 And with that -- with all the differences
25 reconciled, it should be easy to get it through the Board.

1 MS. SOLENTO: Great. Thank you so much.

2 I don't know if this is something that gets
3 addressed to the chairperson of the Planning Board, but
4 developer fees. I brought that up at the meeting last week.
5 There didn't seem to be a response. But between developer
6 fees and COAH trust deposits, I'm not sure that that has
7 happened for years.

8 Again, who's -- who is that addressed to? Who's
9 responsible for that?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure so COAH fees have been
11 regular. The COAH trust account, it has -- currently, I
12 believe it's over \$400,000 in it because of the fees that
13 were made. There was a period of time where you could make
14 a payment, which was the COAH fee, in lieu of having COAH
15 related housing. Round three, which is where we're
16 currently in doesn't allow for that.

17 And because Nutley is an urban aid distressed
18 city, as that designation, we're applying for exemption from
19 the COAH requirement for round 3 as you're probably aware.
20 So the fees have been collected on all of those properties.
21 You can't get a CO unless the COAH has been calculated and
22 paid. So there's that assurance.

23 And I don't believe -- I think I addressed one
24 side of your question. What was the other?

25 MS. SOLENTO: Developer fees.

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Developer fees. There are
2 very clear rules around what you can ask for in terms of --
3 which is an impact fee. And there's an ordinance on our
4 books that relates to. What that has -- generally, it's
5 things that would impact the infrastructure, such as the
6 sewer lines, the water lines, and things like that. And
7 there is a determination made through engineer, as to relate
8 what that is.

9 When it comes to Hoffman-LaRoche, however, and
10 you're looking at a redevelopment, the aspect of what would
11 be a developer fee is broader because there could be impacts
12 on our infrastructure, such as our police department, our
13 other services that we would be able to negotiate.

14 MS. SOLENTO: Okay. And I think I still have a
15 little time because there were a lot of great answers.

16 PSE&G Repaving, is there a schedule plan by
17 street, what the level of repaving? I know some of that has
18 been discussed in terms of when was this last repaved. But
19 could something be -- I know, could something be published?
20 Sorry, I couldn't see you over all the --

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: There's nothing that's been
22 scheduled at this time, Amy.

23 MS. SOLENTO: Okay, so --

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: In fact, they were scheduled to
25 go out and walk the roadways tomorrow, public service and

1 engineering. So that's not going to happen tomorrow.

2 MS. SOLENTO: Right. Absolutely not. Do we have
3 a way to ensure that PSE&G is committing to the timeline?

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Once we decide which roadways
5 and how they're going to be paved, we got a good piece of
6 news today that the -- they're going to be using a state
7 contractor, which will make it easier for us to coordinate
8 with our paving plan. So it's coordinated in that area.

9 MS. SOLENTO: Good. Thank you so much, Mayor.
10 Thank you.

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
12 address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

13 MS. QUIRK: Terry Quirk. 45 Hampton Place.
14 Spokesperson for the Nutley parent Advocacy network.

15 I'm really glad I came to this meeting. I really
16 am because I'm glad to hear how the Commissioners are
17 discussing the gun safety and school safety. This has been
18 a really difficult time for everybody. I mean, the kids --
19 we all went to these meetings. We all heard from them. We
20 heard from parents. Nobody is happy about this. We're all
21 in mourning almost because school has now become a different
22 place.

23 Even here, it's -- I'm not pointing but we have
24 a police officer here and that's okay because you know what,
25 this is the world that we live in now. This is it.

1 So I do want to thank you for having that
2 conversation. I'm tending to agree more with Mr. --
3 Commissioner Rogers than with Commissioner Evans, no
4 offense, but we have a great police department, but if
5 they're not on scene, our worry is that we're up against
6 something like an assault rifle, somebody walks in or has
7 some sort of rifle like that, we're really talking about
8 multiple deaths. And it's so alarming to actually have to
9 actually say that.

10 But it is something. But I'm really glad that you
11 had that conversation and that you're moving forward and
12 you're proceeding. I do have to thank -- I understand on
13 that Monday, on the 26th when the students went back, there
14 were police officers and they were around the school.

15 Now, this was information and we're all going to
16 say this is hearsay, but I'm going to say it anyway. I
17 understand that there were patrols that wanted to enter the
18 high school, just to make the kids feel good, just to walk
19 around, show their support because later on we found out
20 later that night how uncomfortable they were.

21 But we heard through the grapevine that -- and
22 this could be completely wrong -- but we heard that the
23 police were denied access to the building, which I find
24 really difficult.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's not true.

1 MS. QUIRK: Okay. Well, I was just -- but it
2 can't happen. At times like this, our police have to be --

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Terry, let me just --

4 MS. QUIRK: But can I just finish one second?

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah. And then I just
6 want to -- but I just want to --

7 MS. QUIRK: I just want to finish one second.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Go ahead.

9 MS. QUIRK: Because I -- my feeling is that, you
10 know, the police at this time recognize how the kids were
11 and we appreciate that. I mean, this is an opportunity.
12 The police never have an opportunity to really connect with
13 the community and this was the best opportunity.

14 So I'm hoping that in the future as we proceed, we
15 work together in that. And this is not something that I
16 have against this Board of Commissioners, it's really
17 something that we need to move forward with the other Board.
18 But we just really want to proceed and communicate.

19 What did you want to say?

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah, I wanted to say --
21 first of all, I wanted to thank you for all the work you're
22 doing out there, and sending the message out. And I see you
23 also at the meetings and I don't even believe you have any
24 kids in school anymore because --

25 MS. QUIRK: No.

1 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- I believe they went
2 through mine. So that admirable.

3 I won't speak for Commissioner Evans, but I think
4 we are all on the same page on this Board, so I don't know
5 what the disconnect with that was. But -- however, I want
6 you to know that I am an advocate for the school guards to
7 be in the school. Joe Volano (ph), who's our class 3
8 special officer, here tonight, he's a retired guy and that's
9 what I think should be in schools and it should be through
10 the police department because they're trained officers.

11 And it's not an outside company running it.

12 MS. QUIRK: Right.

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: It will be through our
14 police department. It's not a cure all by no means. It's
15 just an extra layer that, you know, you have somebody -- but
16 I just wanted to -- the one thing that I didn't mean to
17 interrupt you. You know the respect I have for you. Is
18 that I have to say that we have been in schools --

19 MS. QUIRK: Okay.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- all along. We had --
21 when Lieutenant Rogers was there. We have LEAD now there.
22 And I have to tell you, our cops are in the schools a lot.
23 And I don't want to throw up a bone for Commissioner Rogers'
24 son, Steve Rogers, who was at Washington School. But we
25 were going to move the cops around and play a little shuffle

1 game.

2 We got so many calls about not to move any of them
3 from any schools, especially his son, because the kids are
4 attached to him and they know them by name. Mike Padilla
5 (ph), another detective, unbelievable, Terry, how the kids
6 run up to him.

7 And what's so important to me about that is that
8 if Little Johnny or Little Susie is having a bad day or is
9 not up to snuff and is thinking about doing something bad, a
10 lot of these kids are running up to Steve Rogers' kid --
11 son, Mike Padilla, and we're about prevention in Nutley. We
12 have a great reactive community of policing here. We have
13 the best equipment. We have the best of the best of the
14 best. But we want to prevent -- and it's my opinion, and I
15 have to commend Steve as well because he's been to all those
16 meetings and the Mayor as well.

17 Look, Terry, our kids are our prized possessions.
18 I have a fourth grader --

19 MS. QUIRK: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- in Spring Garden and I
21 asked him, and my fourth grader is not very athletic. He's
22 not like my other two were, kind of -- you know, he is who
23 he is. And I said to him one night, I said, "Salvatore,
24 daddy wants to ask you a question. What do you think about,
25 you know, having a police officer in the school? An armed

1 -- you know, not in uniform but --" He says, "You know,
2 dad." He goes, "It would make me feel safer." He says,
3 "Not -- even though, I might not see him. He might be in
4 the hallway somewhere and I --" but he goes, "but I think
5 just knowing that he's there, it would make myself and my
6 friends feel safer."

7 You know? And I said it at one of the meetings.
8 You know, it's not always what we want up here, it's what
9 the majority of the people want. We're an extension of the
10 people. And I think that if it makes our kids feel safer,
11 if the majority of the parents want it, and I have to tell
12 you, I have gotten threatening e-mails saying, "If you dare
13 put an armed guard in that school, you know, you'll have a
14 problem. I'll campaign against you." And all that stuff.
15 And that's okay.

16 MS. QUIRK: Yeah.

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Because what -- the
18 conversations I've been having, Terry, is that 10 years when
19 Al Petracco is laying on some beach somewhere, I want to
20 know as the public safety director, as your public safety
21 director, that if God forbid something happens here, I did
22 everything in my power to prevent it.

23 And I think that's very, very important to say.
24 So I believe, you know, it is up to the superintendent and
25 the Board and they're going through those exercises and

1 seeing what best fits for them, but our police department
2 has always had directive patrols to all the schools before
3 we had this threat. And they get out of the cars. They
4 walk around the school perimeter, check the doors, make sure
5 everything is okay.

6 Now, the only thing that we did different was the
7 month when they went back to school is we actually walked
8 into the schools. And we went down the hallways, greeted
9 the principal, and we did that a few times every day to all
10 the schools.

11 Now, that's something that I want -- I really want
12 to continue. However, you were at the Board of Ed meeting
13 that Monday night where somebody said, "Well, you have
14 approximately 70 cops." Which we don't, we have 67. Okay?
15 And somebody is always out injured and somebody is always
16 out on vacation and all that stuff.

17 So we have a minimum of five patrolmen every day.
18 So we don't have -- because somebody said, "Well, if we take
19 10 percent of our fleet, you know, and put them by the
20 schools, you know, we should be okay." But unfortunately,
21 67 guys times 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, you know
22 vacations, holidays, all -- we don't have that many cops
23 there. You know?

24 So we don't want to give up what we have until all
25 our details, but we just received a grant too that we were

1 -- I think -- was it one of three, Tom, in the whole -- one
2 of four. One of four municipalities got a grant to hire
3 cops, you know? And in the beginning, we were kind of -- I
4 was kind of going into let's maintain what we have. But
5 now, and with the Board again, because I can't do this by
6 myself, Terry.

7 MS. QUIRK: Right, no.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You know, we have to have
9 these guys -- they all have a vote. And I have to tell you.
10 So now we are going to be adding numbers through that grant
11 to the police department and I can't do it alone. But I have
12 to tell you, every one of these commissioners up here have
13 stepped up to the plate and said, you know, don't spend the
14 money foolishly but if it -- when it comes to the kids'
15 safety, whatever we have to do is on board. And I think
16 that's admirable.

17 So I just wanted to let you know. And again,
18 Terry, you and I, we've known each other a long time and I
19 respect and I admire what you do. Thank you.

20 MS. QUIRK: All right. Thank you. Just a really
21 quick question for the Mayor.

22 We heard from Commissioner Evans and from
23 Commissioner Rogers, what's your position in regards to --
24 how do you feel about armed guards? Is it something that
25 you don't want to --

1 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Terry, the world is changing and
2 we need to change with it.

3 MS. QUIRK: Yeah.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: That's how I feel.

5 MS. QUIRK: Right. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Terry, to your point, just to
7 be clear, I wasn't disagreeing with Commissioner Rogers. My
8 point was that the idea of -- it's not just the police
9 officer.

10 MS. QUIRK: Right.

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's the social services,
12 counselor, psychologists because you want to avoid the
13 crisis situation where there's all that chaos, right?

14 And I also -- as a father, I don't have any
15 children in the school, but as a parent who would say I'd
16 have children in school, I'd want to know that that police
17 officer, that if he's in or she's in that chaos situation,
18 that they're well trained to handle that.

19 So when you see that you're in a school and all of
20 a sudden somebody comes in and you have children running,
21 teachers running, somebody trying to do this and you're one
22 officer in that school, are you prepared to act? And have
23 you been properly trained?

24 Because if you pull your gun, that 9 millimeter is
25 not going to 15 feet. It's going to go a long distance.

1 And there's a risk that if you miss that you can
2 inadvertently hit somebody else that you don't want to hit.
3 So the training that's required, the practice that's
4 required.

5 MS. QUIRK: Absolutely.

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I think all of that has to be
7 part of the solution. It's not just pick up somebody and
8 say today you're going to be in the school. The person
9 who's going to do that as a job, they need to be on the
10 practice range. They need to be in training for chaos
11 situations.

12 MS. QUIRK: I agree.

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: But more importantly, the
14 safer thing to do is do whatever you can to prevent that.
15 And so one of the things that (indiscernible). See, you
16 have West Virginia University, they have their own security
17 force. It didn't stop it.

18 At Parkland, you had a sheriff's officer there.
19 It didn't stop it, right? But there's a -- if you do it as
20 part of an integrated network of things, which is mostly on
21 identifying early who's at risk.

22 This poor child in Parkland, high risk. 30 calls
23 to the sheriff's office, 4 to the FBI. Placed in
24 alternative school because of his issues. It was just a
25 bomb waiting to explode.

1 MS. QUIRK: Right.

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And they didn't catch it.
3 Here in Nutley, we had one posting. Parents activated,
4 called the police, boom, we're on it.

5 MS. QUIRK: Right.

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And that child is now getting
7 the care that they need, right? So the more we can look at
8 an umbrella of things to make sure that that layer and those
9 layers of interconnecting layers are there, that that
10 actually creates a safer, nor 100 percent, but a safer
11 environment.

12 So what we were talking about was the LEAD program
13 wasn't about having a police officer there to prevent
14 somebody -- from a shooting, it was about relationships with
15 the children, right, in the schools so that they're more
16 willing and more comfortable to approach a police officer
17 and tell them something so you gather that intelligence.

18 And that was so valuable and the continuation of
19 that is so critical. And Commissioner Petracco alluded to
20 it, but I was at the meeting with the School Board where
21 they were talking about hiring an outside security agency.
22 Well, we were able to arrange for the Director of Homeland
23 Security to meet with the school. He met with the Mayor and
24 public safety director yesterday to do a security evaluation
25 of all of our schools.

1 MS. QUIRK: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And that's going to happen
3 very quickly.

4 MS. QUIRK: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: So that's the cooperation
6 between both boards.

7 MS. QUIRK: Thanks.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Mr. Mayor, I'm in a bit of a
9 talkative mood tonight.

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I guess you don't want to get
11 home before -- we're past the --

12 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: No, I do. But when they say
13 -- somebody said to me last week when you get the moment,
14 seize it because it may be a long time before you get that
15 motion again.

16 So Mrs. Terry Quirk, you have given me a moment to
17 seize.

18 First of all, I truly -- I want to follow up on
19 what Commissioner Petracco said because it isn't said
20 enough. I'm sitting here tonight and I'm reading in this
21 resolution about Women's History Month and women who have
22 contributed to their communities, to the state, and to the
23 country.

24 And I'm watching you and I'm saying you're one of
25 them. You're one of those women who, you know what, we may

1 not disagree a lot on things, but the one thing that I can
2 say that you have been doggedly passionate, articulate,
3 knowledgeable. And the one thing that impresses me about
4 you, that I really mean this, you have never come here mean-
5 spirited.

6 You have never come here with an I've got you type
7 of attitude. You've always come here articulate and
8 knowledgeable, knowing what you're talking about and
9 respecting something that -- we mentioned Carmen Orechio
10 earlier, what was so important to him, respecting the
11 integrity of the institutions that you address.

12 So I seize this moment tonight only because you're
13 sitting here. This certainly was not on my mind tonight.
14 But I want to thank you and Commissioner Petracco, thanks
15 for giving me the segue, but I really mean it. And I think
16 you very much.

17 MS. QUIRK: Thank you.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
19 address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

20 MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.

21 The organization meeting of the Economic
22 Development Advisory Committee 2/26/ 2013. And I
23 know over the last two years, we haven't had any meetings.
24 I'd like to see -- have an update on the Economic
25 Development Advisory Committee. And the first thing I'd

1 like to know is of the organization members who were --well,
2 we know Mr. Carmen Orechio who was the Chairman
3 Emeritus is no longer with us. But there was John Barry,
4 John Gizzo, James Grueter, Joseph Haines, Lorraine Kucinski,
5 Vincent LoCurcio, Joseph Russo, Sam Battaglia, Phil Brancato,
6 Angelo Cifelli, Arthur Cifelli, Russell Lazovick, who we
7 know is not -- no longer here in the district, and Thomas
8 O'Brien.

9 Of the original committee, Commissioner Evans,
10 could you tell us who is still on the committee and what is
11 the status of the Economic Development Advisory Committee?

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, so there's no one on the
13 committee because I suspended it.

14 MS. LANDRY: This committee has been suspended?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Absolutely, for a while now. The reason
16 for it is the actions that needed to be addressed are
17 actually integrated with the work that needs to be resolved
18 with the On3 site. So until we get clarity around the
19 direction of that and a big theme for the On3 site is how it
20 integrates into the community, how it supports our business
21 district, and then what would be --would they be able to
22 contribute to helping us address some of those things.

23 Because we had that sort of big unknown there
24 right now, the committee came to a point where one, it was
25

1 becoming clear to consider establishing a special
2 improvement district, getting the Chamber of Commerce to be
3 part of that. And it was too early for us. So basically,
4 we were on the early side. We got a lot of information
5 that's helpful in our discussions with Hoffman-LaRoche and
6 the impact on Hoffman-LaRoche.

7 And so until we actually progress through that a
8 little bit farther, I've suspended that activity until we
9 can clear our way to say, okay, now we can get together and
10 start to make substantive action.

11 We just basically hit a wall where we couldn't go.

12 MS. LANDRY: Okay, thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: So until it -- and so I
14 expect it --

15 MS. LANDRY: The committee is on a pause you would
16 say?

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, a pause might be
18 better. But I -- and when I bring it back, I'll reconsider
19 who should be on that because I think we'll have a different
20 outlook at that time and things -- the things will be
21 clearer.

22 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Thank you. And then you
23 mentioned that tomorrow at 8:00 a.m., there would be a
24 workshop on mixed use and density?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No, a meeting. It's not a

1 workshop, it's a meeting. It's a --

2 MS. LANDRY: A meeting? And who will be attending
3 that meeting?

4 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's an internal meeting
5 between the Code office and the committee of the Planning
6 Board that worked on the mixed used definitions so that they
7 know that they can get together to have a conversation to,
8 in effect, address their differences.

9 MS. LANDRY: And who are the members of that sub-
10 committee of the Planning Board?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I believe it's Jerry DelTufo,
12 Mark Arcuti, and Anthony Malfitano, right?

13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: And Lorraine Kucinski.

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And Lorraine Kucinski.

15 MS. LANDRY: Who?

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Lorraine Kucinski.

17 MS. LANDRY: Lorraine's in Florida.

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. And so she may not be
19 there, but I'm saying that's -- whoever is available was
20 going to meet tomorrow. I think three out of the four were.
21 I'm not sure they're going to meet tomorrow because of the
22 declared state of emergency.

23 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Because you just said that
24 there was a meeting at 8 o'clock.

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's scheduled for 8:00. I

1 don't know -- I don't have the answer so there -- because of
2 the state of emergency, we're not open tomorrow. So maybe
3 on the --

4 MS. LANDRY: Because it was an agenda item for the
5 Planning Board meeting tomorrow night.

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Correct.

7 MS. LANDRY: If the Planning Board meeting takes
8 place, will that --

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: The Planning Board meeting is
10 cancelled.

11 MS. LANDRY: The Planning Board meeting is
12 cancelled. So will this agenda item that was listed -- it
13 was listed as a workshop on mixed density, I mean mixed use,
14 that was noticed as public meeting. So my question is will
15 the agenda item, mixed use workshop for the public meeting,
16 be on the next Planning Board meeting?

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's an issue -- a matter
18 for the Planning Board. I suspect it will be, but that would
19 be something that Carol Tangorra would decide as the Planning
20 Board chair.

21 MS. LANDRY: Okay. So she will decide if it will
22 be an --

23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes.

24 MS. LANDRY: -- agenda item on the next meeting.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Barring anything unforeseen, I

1 can't see why it won't be on.

2 MS. LANDRY: Okay. All right. Thank you so much.

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
4 address the Board of Commissioners?

5 MR. KELLY: John Kelly, 162 Pake Street.

6 I know the debate is very much open on this and I
7 offer no opinion on it. But if we are going to go in the
8 direction of putting armed guards or Class 3 officers in the
9 school, I just would like to offer a friendly suggestion
10 that we remember our vets.

11 Our veterans coming back from overseas, they've
12 been in actual gun fights. They know what to do in these
13 types of situations. And they're facing unemployment at
14 rates higher than the typical average civilian.

15 And so instead of bringing back maybe retired
16 officers, nothing against the retired officers, maybe we can
17 remember our veterans who have served our country so that --

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think that when -- if and
19 when we do this, and again, John, this is not a Board of
20 Commissioners decision.

21 MR. KELLY: Right.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: It's certainly not mine.
23 It's up to the school Board. I am an advocate of Class 3
24 specials, which Mr. Villano is standing over there. You
25 know, he has a lot of history with the Nutley Police

1 Department. He has a lot of history with the buildings,
2 knowing the building. So, you know, our police officers all
3 do ESU training to respond to an active shooter. You came
4 in a little late tonight.

5 You know, what I was saying before, we are the
6 premier Township in police department. Other communities
7 come to train with our officers to try to mirror what we do.
8 So I don't -- I'm not big on just hiring any NC to take that
9 over. I think -- and again, it's not my call, but if I
10 could have it my way, it would be ran through the police
11 department because it would be ran as a para-military
12 organization.

13 Now, there's no reason, I don't believe, and I
14 will check this tomorrow why a veteran, and I think you have
15 two veteran lovers here -- well, four veteran lovers here, I
16 should say. I don't think there's no reason why they
17 couldn't get that classification.

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: But there are -- if I may
19 weigh in a minute. A couple things we have to keep in mind
20 is that a lot of veterans coming from the Middle East are
21 suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. A lot of
22 them. A real good number of them.

23 So that would be another level of screening that
24 would have to be done. But secondly, the -- and I'm for
25 veterans getting these jobs, however, I've been around long

1 enough and spent a career in the military understanding that
2 combat operations in a foreign country are quite, quite
3 different than a community policing operation.

4 In other words, I'm not saying they can't do it,
5 but the transition is very dramatic. I have had
6 discussions, in fact, remember the early part of I guess the
7 month, commissioner -- I went to Commissioner Petracco when
8 the veteran situation came up. And I agreed that yeah, we
9 want to employ veterans. It would be great to have them in
10 there, but to transition in speaking to military personnel
11 is very dramatic. It doesn't say they can't do it, but it
12 would be quite a task, especially -- I happened to talk to
13 two Marines.

14 And I got a Marine and Iraq war vet, Courtney
15 Johnson and Dan Jacobe, who was in Iraq. And they had
16 explained to me also that door to door combat operations in
17 Iraq, the transition would be rather dramatic. It can't be
18 -- I'm not saying it can't be done, but the class 3 community
19 policing training starting off with that may be the way to
20 go.

21 But the door shouldn't be closed. I agree with
22 you. And perhaps down the road we're going to find that
23 we're going to be able to do that. I'm going to assure you.

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And I don't believe that
25 they would be shut out from being a Class 3.

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: No.

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I mean, they would have
3 the right to go through an academy.

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yeah, absolutely.

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And they would go for a
6 sight test as part of our hiring procedure here in Nutley.
7 So I think that it is possible.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: But I think to Commissioner
9 Evans' point, and you articulated this a few times and it
10 was very important, well trained. Very well trained
11 personnel, not only in the use of firearms but in tactical
12 training is very important because it's not only, like you
13 said, taking a gun out and shooting someone. It's engaging
14 the aggressor.

15 And sometimes, you can engage the aggressor
16 without ever firing a shot. So -- and that's something that
17 maybe some of our vets are trained in more than what we
18 would see in the academies these days. But to me, your
19 point is well taken and they haven't been forgotten, believe
20 me.

21 MR. KELLY: Right, I'm not -- I don't mean to
22 suggest that we just pick vets up off the street and drop
23 them into the school system. I'm just saying that we have
24 young veterans coming home who may not have a job
25 opportunity lined up. And we've got to remember them. And

1 if they need the necessary training, give them the training.
2 If they need to go through a psych eval, I'm sure
3 we can employ --

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well, you know, good point.
5 Commissioner Petracco, I don't know, it's been years since
6 I've been involved. But do the class 3 specialists, would
7 -- as on civil service or regular police officers, would
8 veterans get preference? Do we know that?

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I don't --

10 MR. KELLY: I believe they do get some --

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: No? I wonder if we --

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No, I don't -- I know that
13 they get it through civil service, through the main hiring
14 process to become a police officer.

15 As far as a class 3, which I believe what would
16 happen is that they would come back, and they would have to
17 go through the academy to get the certification --

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Can we, and this would be
19 you, all right?

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: But can we think about an
22 ordinance, if we could do it, counselor, legally to give
23 veterans who go through the training, the process --
24 preference on these Class 3 lists? Or is it still the
25 discretion of the police commissioner to appoint who he

1 wants or who he believes is well trained?

2 MR. GENITEMPO: I can't answer that question now.
3 I'd have to take a look at that. It's possible. It's
4 possible.

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Listen, I -- look. I
6 always give veterans a nod. You know, that's --

7 MR. KELLY: Anyone here-

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right, no. And we're not
9 taking --

10 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: It's a good idea.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We're not taking a
12 defensive stance, but I will tell you this, John, I went to
13 -- and one thing Commissioner Rogers didn't touch on is the
14 social skills. You know, I know quite a few guys that are in
15 the Belleville school systems and it's the intelligence that
16 we're after.

17 You know, look, putting armed guards in a school
18 with a 9 millimeter and the guy comes in there with an AK-
19 47, it's not really an easy match. This is to try to
20 prevent something from happening.

21 And a lot of the police officers are just -- the
22 armed guards that they have in Belleville, it's the
23 intelligence that they gather in the schools that I'm really
24 after, prevent, prevent, prevent.

25 So with that being said, I want the best and the

1 brightest in those schools, whoever that person is. If it's
2 a vet, absolutely. If it's a retired police officer. But I
3 think that the most important thing to come out of tonight
4 is we're all vet-friendly and I appreciate you coming up to
5 the mike.

6 But whoever -- when we go through the process of
7 hiring somebody, we go through the process to recognize
8 that. This guy is going to have a gun in our Town, you
9 know, and be driving around in our streets and talking to
10 our children and protecting our parents and ourselves. So
11 when it comes to hiring police, you know, I -- we have a --
12 just so you know, we have a committee in the police
13 department that does all the screenings. And then they take
14 those candidates, John, and who they think are the best and
15 brightest, no matter if they're veterans, if they're
16 civilians, if they're -- whatever they are. But that's who
17 we're after to hire.

18 And to put, you know, them in the school, I would
19 follow that same practice. If it happens to be a vet, I
20 would be glad to give them a job.

21 MR. KELLY: Right. I'm not suggesting a way to
22 implement this or any sort of procedure or anything. I'm
23 just merely just pointing out there to the Board that let's
24 not forget our vets who are coming from overseas.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We never do. We never do

1 for any --

2 MR. KELLY: And I'm not saying --

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And again, and again, and
4 again, this isn't our decision. You know, this isn't our
5 decision to make.

6 So you know what, as much as I want to be part of
7 it, you know, somebody could say, you know what, you're not
8 on the School Board, you're not the superintendent. When we
9 need you, we'll call you.

10 And it hasn't been like that. They've been very
11 cooperative with me. The chief, we've been sitting in on
12 meetings. Like I commended Commissioner Evans for setting
13 that up with Homeland Security yesterday.

14 You know, look, we -- what's our most prized
15 possession is our children. You know, and we will go
16 through great lengths. You came in a little late tonight.
17 We passed an ordinance tonight for the police department's
18 TO to add another lieutenant's position. It was voted on
19 unanimously because we realize we're not going to spare the
20 expense to protect our children on this Board.

21 And hopefully, you know, I spoke to Dr. Glazier
22 hand in hand, many phone calls in person. And she says to
23 me, "Al, I don't have an opinion. I'm not a professional.
24 If there should be a school guards in the school or if there
25 shouldn't be." She wants to do her due diligence and I

1 respect that and gather all the information. She doesn't
2 want to shoot from the hip and just say, okay, let's do
3 this. She wants to do her due diligence and then come up
4 with her conclusion. And I think she has the right to do
5 that.

6 You know, so -- you know, she's doing a lot of
7 listening to the experts. Our chief has been talking to
8 her. You know what I mean? Look, armed guards are in
9 Fairfield, you know? They're in Livingston. You know, so
10 -- you know, again, it's not a cure all but it's just
11 another layer that hopefully that gentleman or that woman
12 that's sitting in those schools is friendly with these kids,
13 and they get the intelligence.

14 And if there's a kid that's having a problem
15 that's going to do something bad, again, prevention is the
16 name of the game.

17 MR. KELLY: All right. I didn't mean to suggest
18 that anyone on this Board isn't vet friendly. I was just
19 saying let's not forget our vets. And I do expect that -- or
20 understand that you guys are going to be part of the
21 conversation. And it was brought up tonight and I just
22 wanted to put that suggestion out there.

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you. We appreciate
24 it.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you. Would anybody else

1 like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

2 Seeing none.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

5 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

6 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

10 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye. Stay safe everybody.

13 MADAM CLERK: And the time is 8:24.
