I have a 21 public hearing on an salary ordinance adjustment to add the role of a elevator inspector, as well as to replace 22 23 my retiring plumbing inspector. 24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Anybody wish to be heard on Ordinance Number 3421? 25

1	MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.
2	Mr. Evans, I understand that you explained the
3	ordinance in the back very well, but I was just
4	curious, you said that, if I understand it correctly,
5	we're paying for half of in one of those
6	salaries, health insurance? Is that correct?
7	COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's actually less.
8	Less than half.
9	MR. MOORE: Less than then why why is
10	everybody else who's hiring independent contractors,
11	they're not paying benefits or health at all, but yet
12	we are?
13	COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, so we by and
14	large, we don't, but when it comes to building
15	inspectors, plumbing inspectors, in order to have
16	someone who has a master's plumbing inspector's shield,
17	a master plumber with a shield, we want to have
18	somebody who's more dedicated to our town, similar to
19	the way our previous plumbing inspector was dedicated
20	to our town, and the arrangement's a little bit
21	different. So this particular plumbing inspector will
22	split his time in two towns, and the other town has
23	made the same arrangement. So it's a very good deal
24	for us, because the salary cost is and in fact, when
25	you look at the salary cost, the benefits, and the

pension of the old inspector, overall, we're spending 1 quite a bit less money to do that. 2 MR. MOORE: The other town -- is -- are we in 3 cahoots with this --4 5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Cahoots, did you say? MR. MOORE: Yes, cahoots. You're -- we're 6 7 paying half of his medical and they're paying half of his medical. But if he has a master plumbing license, 8 9 technically, they operate as an independent contractor. COMMISSIONER EVANS: He does not -- he's not 10 operating his business anymore. He's actually doing 11 inspections full-time, and he works in two towns. 12 13 his arrangement in the other town is part-time as well as it is in Nutley, and when he goes -- the way it will 14 15 work out, he will be below the number of hours it's necessary for him to work in that other town, for them 16 to pay his full benefits. So it's just a differential 17 18 in his co-pay. We're picking up that amount. 19 MR. MOORE: And is his -- is his contract 20 with this other town, does that mirror ours, so that we 21 don't have to worry about something affecting his other contract, that we're --22 23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's right. 24 MR. MOORE: -- going to wind up paying --25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No --

22	here with Rosemary Gabe, who is my committee
23	member/chair. We actually represent the American
24	Foundation for Suicide Prevention, and we are here on
25	behalf of the West Essex Walk, that will be taking

place on October 20th in Verona Park.

Rosemary happens to be a resident of Verona, and I and our fellow colleagues want to invite everyone here in Nutley to participate, and ask us any questions that you may have on how we can get more people here in Nutley involved in preventing suicides from happening.

As you know, suicide is a huge problem, not only in our community, but also across communities in New Jersey, and across the country. And we're here to actually educate people who have been touched by this tragedy, as well as to help as many people as possible, prevent this from ever happening again. So we would just love to see Nutley, in the spirit of them helping so many others in other parts of our community, help those that may be suffering as well from suicide.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Say a word -- a couple words?

DR. MURPHY: Well, I actually wrote some cards to address the (indiscernible).

THE CLERK: Thank you.

DR. MURPHY: I have been volunteering for about three years with this organization, AFSP focuses on research, education, advocacy, support, and outreach in a lot of communities. It's a great volunteer opportunity that I've become involved in. I'm very

proud to be involved in it. I think it's made a 1 difference in our community, already. Not only in the 2 community, but on the -- in the way we have changed 3 over the course of a couple years, so I would -- we 4 5 have -- the walk that we started was originally called the Verona Park Walk, and we branched out and changed 6 7 it to the West Essex Walk, to involve a lot of other 8 towns in this -- you know, opportunity to make a 9 difference. So --MAYOR SCARPELLI: Can you give us the date of 10 11 the walk again? Yeah, it's October 20th. 12 DR. MURPHY: 13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: So, I can tell you that three commissioners up here are very involved with 14 15 mental health. We understand --16 DR. MURPHY: Thank you. MAYOR SCARPELLI: -- the issue with suicide 17 18 prevention and suicide awareness, and we'll see how we 19 can participate. 20 DR. MURPHY: Thank you. 21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: But we thank you for coming 22 and letting us know about that. 23 DR. MURPHY: Thank you. 24 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Mr. Mayor, may I? 25 Commissioner Rogers, the Director of the Department of

Public Affairs --

DR. MURPHY: Yes.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: -- and Health. I like what I hear, and I like what I hear because for about a year, and these gentlemen don't even know this, so I'm not going to get too involved into what I'm going to say. For about a year, we've been working on a very significant project that'll really impact what you're talking about, and I'm hoping that the project we're working on will go national, and it'll come right out of Nutley.

So I'm going to ask you to do me a favor. We do have a therapist on staff, working with the county, and Commissioner Tucci, who are instrumental in that, bringing Vince on board. He's talked to a lot of veterans, and I know of two, who were really on the verge of taking their lives, and he was able to prevent that through the therapy that we are now providing them.

But I -- I'm going to ask -- I'm going to get your card, and I'm going to ask Vince or someone on our staff, to give you a call tomorrow, and maybe we could kind of marry up, and include you, in what we're doing. But specifically, do you -- would you work on veterans and their families? That's very important, because

21

there's been an increase nationally of veterans just 1 killing themselves. 2 DR. MURPHY: 3 Yes. COMMISSIONER ROGERS: And so we need help in 4 5 that area. DR. MURPHY: It is, it's a very important 6 7 aspect of the outreach that AFSP works towards. I know 8 in the town where I live, we -- over the course of 9 three years, we've offered various educational There's one program in particular that we 10 just offered, and this is all through the funds that 11 we've raised in the Out of the Darkness Walk. Mental 12 13 Health First Aid. It's a great program, we just offered it a couple months ago, and basically, 14 everybody that took the program was able to become 15 certified in how to react in a mental health crisis. 16 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: 17 Who funds you? 18 DR. MURPHY: It's all grassroots. Public 19 donations. COMMISSIONER ROGERS: 20 Oh, so you're a 21 non-profit? 22 It's a non-profit, yeah. DR. MURPHY: 23 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okav. 24 DR. MURPHY: So, the other program that we 25 ran that I was really proud of was, It's Real College

and Mental Health, and we gave that to the high school 1 seniors that were, you know, going on to college. 2 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. That's fine. 3 So it's -- and I ask because one of the components we're 4 5 looking at is government/business partnerships. locally, but what you're doing is something I think is 6 7 an important component. Because they thought they were all alone, and they were afraid. Their children grew up, if they were parents of a gay or a transgender or a bisexual child, moved away, didn't want to stay in Nutley. And these parents were told, don't talk about it. Times are changing. And I think one of the reasons times are changing is because of the internet, and social media, it tends to amplify voices and messages. And prior to the internet, the messages that we heard were primarily negative, because people who did show support did it quietly. And my message is, it's time to not be quiet anymore, because that wasn't working, and you heard, and I want to thank you.

I do want to say that one person said -- and I think this is important, that she was happy for me and my child, as if I did this just for two people in Nutley, me and my child. This is for all of Nutley. All of Nutley, expressing you as leaders, taking the leadership role, and expressing support for the LGBTQ residents of Nutley. It helps not only the LGBTQ residents, and their families, but it, you know, we're all related to, live next door to, work with, on a daily basis, interact with people who are LGBTQ, and we may not even know it.

So when we remove the mystery, we remove the

shame, and discover that we have new friends, and new relationships. And I think this is important, if I just may give you a couple of statistics here. If we're all interested in mental health, as we say that we are, and the high rates of suicide, it also affects, in a very strong way, the LGBTQ community.

According to the Human Rights Campaign's 2019
LGBTQ Youth Report, only 13 percent of youth report
hearing positive messages about being LGBTQ in school.
This means 87 percent of youth hear either nothing, or
negative messages about being LGBTQ. And when LGBTQ
topics are not talked about, they're perceived as
taboo, something to be ashamed of, and inappropriate.
If a child, a student, or an adult identifies as LGBTQ,
they feel the shame of not being normal. And this is
why we have high rates of suicide, which Nutley is not
immune to.

So I want to thank you three commissioners for signing what I think is Nutley -- for Nutley, a historic document, because this is the first acknowledgment from Nutley that Nutley is an inclusive community, and that we're making a commitment to support our LGBTQ residents and their families, and I'd like to ask the two commissioners who didn't sign this proclamation, if they would sign the proclamation

I'm not blaming you, and I'm not blaming anybody, but just, I want it on the record tonight, that you know what? Ιf we don't agree with a topic, and it's one topic out of a thousand, that that makes us bad people, because we believe something different than some -- and it's not what you're -- with some other organizations -- you know, this is a national topic, obviously, but I have to tell you, I can take a lot, but when people want to start attacking your livelihood because you -- you -because your mother's sick and you had to run out of the meeting? And it happens to be an ex-town worker here, right, that's on that site? It's shameful. it takes all the punch out of doing something good in front of these children, that we've always put Nutley's kids first, before everybody, and set the example, as role models.

So I'm not upset with you, but I am passionate for this subject. I don't ever want it to be received that somebody's going to bully me into doing something that I don't want to do. I sign papers every day, and I read what I sign, and I know what I'm signing. But to get attacked on the internet -- and I'm not perfect. And sometimes things are said, and maybe they're true, maybe they're not, but this time, everybody's far off base. And it's insulting. And it takes the spirit of this proclamation, of people getting bullied to -- for people bullying me and my family?

My kids have never got involved in one subject, or my wife. My wife has never come to this meeting, or my children. I only came because I knew you were coming tonight, Rhonda, or I'd be with my mother tonight, that's where I would be. And you know what, my kids and my wife wanted to come here, and tell everybody what kind of person Al Petracco really is, because that interception on the internet really is not called for.

MS. FROBOSE: Listen. At the end of the day,
I think we want the same thing, and we don't want
another person to feel so unwelcomed and shamed that
they don't want to get out of bed, or they take their

own life. 1 Am I right? Are we all on the same page about that? 2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Listen, we're all on 3 the same page. You know what, there's a lot of groups 4 that have mental illness, and, you know, things, and 5 you know, it's a national topic, and I'm not willing to 6 7 discuss the inclusion part of it, all that stuff. I am 8 willing to sign the proclamation because I believe in 9 the good people in that organization, and in the group. But like I said, some of these comments, even 10 11 as an elected official, they get old. 12 MS. FROBOSE: Point taken. 13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Rhonda.
