21	Why did they have to submit an application for the
22	walk? And Black Lives Matter doesn't have to do that?
23	MAYOR TUCCI: Mr. Moore, our procedure is
24	always for town sponsored events, or events that will
25	he held here in the town that the Board of

1 Commissioners support, to submit an event application. It's not a protest, it's an event. 2 MR. MOORE: I didn't say it's a protest. 3 Why do they have to submit one, but Black Lives Matter 4 5 doesn't? Isn't it on the safety and the benefit of the townspeople that they know how many people will be 6 7 there, where, will streets be blocked off, where will 8 they go to the bathroom? 9 MR. GENITEMPO: Mr. Mayor, can I answer that? 10 MAYOR TUCCI: Rory, I think it has to do with 11 their --12 MR. MOORE: Please. 13 MAYOR TUCCI: -- First Amendment rights, but Mr. Genitempo, can you address this, please? 14 15 MR. MOORE: It's very difficult to hear you. I couldn't have said it 16 MR. GENITEMPO: 17 better myself, Mr. Mayor. It's a First Amendment issue 18 versus a community event issue. The Thriving Survivors and other groups have always applied for permits, or at 19 least submitted letters, I should say, for the 20 21 permission. But political protests are considered 22 differently under the Constitution. 23 MR. MOORE: They're considered for free 24 No one's denying free speech. speech. 25 MR. GENITEMPO: Mr. Moore. Thank you.

- 19 have been very cooperative with the township, advised
- 20 us of their intentions, and been very cooperative with
- 21 the police department and the township in their
- 22 activities. So it's worked out in terms of that issue,
- and that's the answer to your question. Thank you.

8	township to have control and oversight over the entire				
9	squad, that Commissioner Petracco is the commissioner				
10	in charge of that, and lately, we've realized during				
11	our investigational study, that there that				
12	Mr. Geltrude was originally brought into this because				
13	of his the trust of the commissioners of him was let				
14	go by your emergency rescue squad in terms of				
15	performing the audit without permission of Commissioner				
16	Petracco. Ultimately, another				
17	UNIDENTIFIED: That's just for here.				
18	MR. MAZZA: I can barely hear you,				
19	Mr. Genitempo.				
20	MR. GENITEMPO: Okay, thank you. Ultimately,				
21	we found out that the squad retained another accountant				
22	without the town's permission. Despite the fact if				
23	it's a 501(c)(3), the town still controls the				
24	operations of the department. After seeing the 2019				
25	return that was prepared by this new accountant,				

certain questions arose that need to be answered. 1 Commissioners, of course Commissioner Petracco, trust 2 Mr. Geltrude with his experience, his knowledge of the 3 squad, and frankly, his expertise, to be able to review 4 the finances, particularly the last year and a half, as 5 to what's going on. I'd rather not be more specific, 6 7 because I don't think there's any reason to be, 8 regarding what's in those returns, but we will be 9 addressing it. UNIDENTIFIED: (Indiscernible). 10 11 MR. GENITEMPO: I should unmute, then, right? (Indiscernible). 12 UNIDENTIFIED: 13 MR. GENITEMPO: Okay. But we'll -- we're going to be -- address it, and we hope to have a very 14 15 cordial result and continued operation of the squad. You know, to the benefit of the Township of Nutley. 16 MR. MAZZA: Thank you for answering the 17 18 question. 19 MR. GENITEMPO: You're welcome. 20 MAYOR TUCCI: Thank you. 21 I don't see any other hands MR. GENITEMPO: 22 up. I also want to announce that we are -- we have rescheduled the rabies clinic. It will be occurring -- it's a free rabies clinic, it will be occurring this Monday, July 13th, at Chestnut Street Firehouse from 5 to 8 p.m. We're pleased to announce that we have the community blood drive scheduled for Thursday, July 16th, in honor of Anne Rotonda. It's appointment only, and it's been completely booked, so we're grateful that everyone has pledged to donate, and we're encouraged to see everyone making a donation. We'll be looking to possibly schedule another one in the future, due to the high demand.

I also want to announce that the Pediatric
Vaccine Clinic is resuming. It will resume every third
Wednesday of the month, and children are going to be
seen by appointment only. And lastly, I want to touch
on masks. Masks are required in public spaces whenever
you cannot maintain the social distancing required
distance. However, I strongly encourage people to
remove their mask if they're driving by themselves.
There was an incident where an elderly woman lost
consciousness, crashed, and ultimately died as a result
of wearing a mask when she was driving alone. So just

2	safe to remove your mask, maybe you don't have to wear
3	it.
4	Also, we have reported incidents where people
5	who wear glasses, and they're wearing a mask, also have
6	their glasses fogging, which diminishes their ability
7	to see. So also keep that in mind, especially even
8	if you're not driving, if you're crossing the street,
9	maybe you won't be able to see the cars clearly. So
10	just keep that in mind when wearing masks. That's it.

20	but they also can renew their animal license.

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MR. MOORE: Well, the young lady that did the research called me, because I had a number of questions, and she was so helpful. It appears that you cannot submit in writing in advance of the convention the classes you would like to attend. The number one reason people go to there is to see the vendors. Number two reason is to network. Classes were down something like three or four. You have to use your swipe card that you receive at the door in order to register for the class, and you have to swipe it on the way out of the class to get credit for it. So I really don't understand why we're spending all this money, pretty close to \$35,000. She looked everything up, and we paid something like \$3200 and we don't receive any direct benefits whatsoever from the League.

I had asked a question, is there going to be a convention this year, and they do not know because of the COVID, obviously. She said that they're going to this new thing, or they've had it, it's called a mini-conventions, where you could sit at your desk and look at all the videos you want all day long, and we don't have to bear the expenses of sending people down

to Atlantic City. Doesn't that sound like a good idea?

MAYOR TUCCI: Sounds like a good idea to me.

MR. MOORE: Then why can't we put some kind of a commitment from the commissioners now, that you're going to try to save money on wasteful spending? This obviously is rather wasteful. I just saved you \$35,000.

MAYOR TUCCI: Well, Mr. Moore, number one, this Board of Commissioners saves every dime that it can in the interest of lessening the tax burden on our people. I can speak for my department. Three people went down from my department. My superintendent of Parks and Recreation, my Field and Buildings supervisor, and I was the third person that was to be in attendance at that convention, but I wasn't feeling well, and so I substituted another assistant foreman in my department to go down there, so I do not believe that that's excessive, and I do not believe that you have received correct information.

I mean, the other commissioners can speak for themselves, as far as, you know, what their requirements are and what their people need to go down there for, and I know -- and I know from my own personal experience, that there are different classes that you would need to attend, including one from the

1	Joint Insurance Fund, all right, on Employee Practices
2	Liability, where we actually get a reduction in our
3	premium of \$250, okay, per commissioner. And every
4	commissioner for as long as I can remember has complied

- the way, advised us he wasn't even told he was 1 terminated when he called to do the '19 return, they 2 told him, oh, sorry, we got somebody else. So -- and 3 frankly, you have to have a proper resolution of your 4 5 Board of Directors, and your Board of Directors, we want to see the resolutions, and steps, and the minutes 6 7 of those meetings to confirm. So we -- I find that there -- there -- I --8 9 my position is, there is absolutely no ethical problem. In fact, I think it's an economy of savings here, and 10 as long as you don't have any dispute of Mr. Geltrude's 11 qualifications and abilities, then I don't see any 12 ethical issues. 13 MR. 14	MR. GENITEMPO: Well, if we hired a third
15	party forensic accountant, it could cost 40 to \$50,000.
16	So I think the economy of scale is important here.
17	We're not looking for a problem. We just want to look
18	at it and be able to understand the finances. If
19	you've seen the tax return, I'm sure you could agree
20	MR. TYBURSKI: I have.

22	some concern about what's going on from year to year
23	with the increase in salaries, the increase in
24	expenses, and the negative loss on the tax return. A

MR. MAZZA: James Mazza, 152 Beech. I moved to Nutley almost six years ago due to my experiences serving with the Nutley Volunteer Emergency and Rescue Squad. Excuse my appearance; I've been rather sick for this week, and thankfully today received word my COVID test was negative.

In my nearly 14 year service to NVERS, 12 as a volunteer and one and a half as a paid employee, I have seen massive change, growth, and sacrifice. When I started, volunteers were committed to riding 100 plus hours a month in order to cover all nights and

weekends. Unlike the majority of other volunteer EMS agencies, we required our volunteers to be in quarters as opposed to home for their shift. This meant 100 plus hours a month away from our home and our families, but it ensured a prompt time -- response time to all 911 calls.

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As more and more families became dual income households, it was not feasible to keep this model going. Since the 1980s, we have had paid staff during the week, Monday through Friday. This is not a new development. Over time, we have increased this paid coverage to allow us to provide services to the township at the same level, free of charge and free of taxpayer expense. Our volunteer numbers depleted due to the strong rider commitment of 100 plus hours a Initially, we had paid staff month, began to rebound. on one of our volunteer nights, but over the course of one and a half years, we were able to bring all five week nights to volunteerism.

Nutley Volunteer Emergency and Rescue Squad has been the most diverse organization within the Township of Nutley. We have employed and added as volunteer members men and women of all races, creeds, and sexual orientations. People from all over Essex County have come to volunteer here, at Nutley Rescue,

due to our reputation within the county. When new EMTs are in school and ask their teachers where they might be able to volunteer, our agency is the top of the list of places to go and learn the profession of EMS and be treated with respect and dignity.

While each successive generation of leaders has changed things at NVERS, they have always done so while trying to honor the past. Senior members are consulted, and their opinions are considered and weighed heavily on the entire decision making process. Sometimes those opinions are not utilized, but it is a testament of good leadership to surround yourself with people who give varied opinions before making an actual decision.

I have been the secretary, the treasurer, the president, and CEO, a volunteer captain and now the paid assistant chief. Throughout all of this, one thing has always been constant. The citizens of Nutley are grateful for the service we provide, while the Commissioner of Public Safety sees us as merely a political tool and an afterthought. Commissioner Petracco hasn't had no problem calling the president, myself at the time, in order to get a transport for a friend of his, or someone who's politically connected in the town, regardless of what it would do to staffing

- for township residents. We always made it work.

 Transporting the politically connected individual while
- at the same time covering the township.

 Over five years ago when I called about a

Over five years ago when I called about a leak in the roof of the township owned and maintained building, a building that was owned by NVERS until 12 years ago, I was given a runaround between Commissioner Petracco and now Mayor Tucci for months. It was only when black mold started to become visible, and the water leaking from our ceiling and I, president at the time, stated that I would be obligated to contact OSHA or POSHA about the potential health hazard to my volunteers and paid staff, that the Township of Nutley replaced the roof.

NVERS presence at events that make him or other agencies within his department look good. NVERS always steps up. When he goes around to read to the schoolchildren of Nutley with the Police and Fire Chiefs, he conveniently forgets to include the Chief of EMS. Commissioner Petracco is quick to request NVERS' presence at various public relations events, such as the birthday drive-bys. NVERS answers the call.

Meanwhile, for over three months, NVERS handled every EMS emergency within the township while

never getting mutual aid. Members and employees provide 100 plus hour weeks, myself included, in order to make this possible. Members and employees went above and beyond, risking our lives, at no cost to the Leadership at Nutley Police and Nutley Fire township. said they would not be responding to medical emergencies, as it would risk their personnel safety. We were alone. Did we get a thank you proclamation from the town? No. We got what appears to be an attempted hostile takeover.

NVERS is a diverse group of men and women of all races, religions, and sexual orientations. As an assistant chief, I worry about the Department of Public Safety having my members' backs when the Commissioner of Public Safety refuses to sign a Pride proclamation two years in a row. Still, we get on the ambulance and provide our all for the residents of Nutley. Even while our members are attacked in spirit by the commissioner. A commissioner that did not even know enough about the Chief of EMS that when he died in the line of duty on May 19th, 2017, he talked about how his children would miss him. Our departed chief, Michael J. Rossi, Junior, had no children.

If the commissioner took a moment to talk to the community at large, he would know that NVERS makes

the town of Nutley appear second to none in the EMS community within Essex County. Whenever the county needs assistance, they know they can count on NVERS to supply resources. NVERS resources have deployed -- excuse me. NVERS resources have deployed throughout the county on various events over the last three years, including most recently demobilizing the COVID Field Hospital in Secaucus.

endurance. We have sacrificed thousands of hours of our lives, blood, sweat and tears, for the Township of Nutley, a township who is incredibly spiteful. Endurance, because no matter what adversity we have had to go through, we have always moved forward and bounced back. And the \$220,000? That's the price of a new

ambulance which was purchased.

It's a determination by the IRS.
