    circulated a lot of information, and basically, it was
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a horse race to keep on top of the changes for the state, but I hope everyone was able to take advantage of that.

And I just want to do a special shoutout to Sam Fleitell, who I coordinated with, and was very helpful in spreading the word, as well as all the commissioners, because all of you were out there doing the same thing.

So we -- the Governor, as well, just announced today that there will be a -- starting the week of the 19th of August, a rental reimbursement for small rental owners who haven't been able to collect rent. Three units to ten units. And there will be an application process starting with that. I have very little information, but I just wanted to make people aware that that's coming out.

We continue to look for ways to help the business district. I've asked the chief, with John [Kelly], together, is there a way we can do temporary barriers that could avoid business owners having to incur the cost of a park in the street, which is very, very expensive. So we're exploring those options, and we're continuing to coordinate with the Chamber.

MAYOR TUCCI: Great. Just to follow up on the rental assistance, we had our mayors' meeting this morning with the county executive and the chief of staff, and they will be coming out with protocols where dollars will be available through the Community Development Block Grant program.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Oh, good.

MAYOR TUCCI: So as soon as we get that, we will obviously distribute that, and get that to all those in need.

Commissioner Kelly?

COMMISSIONER KELLY: Thank you, Mayor. I don't have much tonight. Last week we had COVID testing and antibody testing, and I want to say that despite many of the challenges that last week presented, it was a great success, and the company that was doing the testing had nothing but compliments to say about the -- this town and the community and everyone who they interacted with. They were -- they said this was one of the best communities that they ever tested since this pandemic has started, so that's truly a testament to everyone in this town, and in this community.

So thank you to everyone, and we're going to look to try to do it again. I know with the -- some of the issues that last week presented, not everyone was able to get in, and there was a lot of demand for it,

A couple days afterwards, I mean, you know most people had their powers restored. I think Public Service did a pretty good job by us too. They called

out -- I met crews from Alabama in here, and after a couple days, it's almost like (audio interference) was a storm, even here.

And I have to tell you, as far as the police and fire perspective, it was, you know, really worse than Sandy was for us. We didn't have the rain, but we had the wind. I want to thank the ambulance squad up the street also for doing their part during a critical time in town. But I do want to compliment you, Joe, too, your department. I saw them out there picking up the branches in the street today.

But I would be remiss, Mayor, if I didn't say this, because we had a tree fall right by the deli. Frank DeMaio, to me, is what Nutley's all about. He leads by example. He was out there, on his hands and knees, picking stuff up off the ground. I mean, it was really good to see that. To me, he's weighted -- he's worth his weight in gold. He's always out there for us, and just having the deli, and seeing it with my own eyes, how fast things are done in this town.

I mean, if you drive through town now, you'd really not even know that there was a storm of that magnitude here in our town. So, you know, the police, I want to thank the police and fire for sitting on wires, all our volunteers, the fire volunteers as well.

We had guys out there for three, four days, sitting on these live wires, because we didn't know if they were live or not. But again, a tremendous job by all the departments. Thank you, Mayor.

MAYOR TUCCI: Thank you, Commissioner. One of the drawbacks of going last is some of your announcements are taken up by the other commissioners, but I also would like to echo Commissioner Petracco's compliments; not only to the Parks Department, but the DPW, Police, Fire, and EMS. Everyone worked so well together, the Health Department, Finance, everyone pitching in.

And you're absolutely right, Commissioner.

Frank DeMaio, during this storm -- as he is pretty much through all of his duties and activities in town, is the epitome of what Nutley is all about. When Nutley people are in need, Nutley people buckle down and get the job done. So I just want to thank everyone for their cooperation, and I'm sure our townspeople appreciate it.

And during Sandy, we had 1.7 million people out of power in the state of New Jersey. During this hurricane last Tuesday, we had 1.4 million people out of power. And after the hurricane hit, there were 400 homes that had absolutely no power. Then we had a

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    of, I probably slept through it, where it knocked out
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    1,200 homes of power, all right?

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    states to come in and help us, and I think it was
    phenomenal.

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By way of some history, most of the commissioners may recall that we came before them for -- or we came before you for a consistency review about two years ago, maybe a little less than two years ago, at which time we not only showed the subdivision and site plan with regard to 100 and 200 and the proposed garage, we also presented a layout for the parking area adjacent to 111 Ideation Way, formerly that was known as Building 102 in the Hoffman-LaRoche Campus, and it is now referred to as 1 point -- Lot 1.05 in Block 300. That was, you'll recall, the result of a subdivision which merged Lots 1 -- parts of Lot 1 and 20 in Block 300, and then subdivided so that the portion where 111 Ideation Way is located, which was included in the Phase II-A redevelopment plan, became Lot 1.05, and there's the remainder lot, which is a piece that was not included in that redevelopment plan, which continues down Ideation Way and wraps around to Kingsland.

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previously presented to you. You may recall that under the redevelopment plan and the redevelopment agreement, there was a possibility of a 32,000-plus square foot 3 pilot plant that was considered for construction on a piece of the lot that's before you. It was an alternative, not a requirement, and much of the parking 7 that was proposed on this lot was anticipated to be needed for that pilot plant. As you're aware, that building is fully occupied, and functions with the parking that's currently on site. That is a total of 120 parking spaces, and there are some on-street spaces as well.

When we came before you previously, we proposed to add an additional -- I think we actually thought there were 121 or 22 spaces on site -currently, there are actually 120. And we were proposing to provide about another 100, 108 spaces. And again, those were calculated, as Rich will explain, based upon the -- largely upon the 32,000 square foot pilot plan.

We have now -- oh, and one of the things we discussed with you that evening was the fact that as a result of the expansion as been proposed, we were reducing the landscaped area, the buffer, between the residential homes that adjoin the site to the east. We maintained a minimum of 17-point-something feet, but we did increase -- propose to increase the landscaping.

As a result of this proposal, we are not reducing the buffering to the residential nearly to the same degree, and not at all in the area of the homes closest to our property.

We are not proceeding with the pilot plant.

That will not be constructed, and therefore reduces the demand for parking beyond what's there. And therefore, we are proposing to reduce the amount of parking proposed to a total of 146 on-site, and increasing three on-street parking spaces up to a total of ten proximate to the building. So -- excuse me.

So those are some of the changes that we are proposing. Rich can explain how that was calculated, and so I would ask that Rich go through the actual numbers. I know we submitted plans, and I apologize. I didn't realize we were able to come before you live this evening. We understood that we could only present in a virtual manner. So I hope -- I know we submitted a number of plans a number of weeks ago, side by side showing previously proposed and current, as well as the overall layout. So I'm hoping that you have the plans, or have reviewed the plans, and I'll ask Rich to -- well, let me have Gene, since we just referred to him,

before we go to Rich.

Gene, if you could just also describe for the Board why you have -- or the commissioners -- why you have a comfort that what we're proposing will be more than adequate for the demand as it now exists with the tenanted building.

MR. DIAZ: Sure, thanks, Meryl.

Good evening, Commissioners. Nice to see you all, if not from a -- from afar, here. The original parking demands for this building were actually -- was actually created very early on by the original lease requirements. Those lease requirements were given to us by the tenants as we negotiated the transactions, principally Modern Meadow and Hackensack's Center for Discovery and Innovation.

And they included, at that point in time, the possibility of the addition -- of the parking necessary to accommodate the -- then the planned and proposed pilot plant. The original -- I think it's important from a context standpoint to understand, the original R&D or laboratory zoning for this campus was actually one spot per thousand square feet. And when we aggregated the parking spaces that the tenants believed they would need, we came out to somewhere closer to two and a half spaces per thousand, including the extra

spots for the pilot plant.

Since the original presentation that was made regarding the anticipated improvements that the -- that Meryl spoke about that we were going to add parking on-site, two homeowners had approached us -- one I think just after the meeting, and then one a short time thereafter via email or phone call, and echoed just some concerns or some questions again about the buffer between that parking plan and their houses.

As things developed, it got us thinking, well, can we do this more efficiently? And as we started to look at this more efficiently, and then engaged with Hackensack and with Modern Meadow, and y-mAbs, which occupies a portion of the lower level of the building, as we engaged with those tenants on their parking needs and trying to optimize layouts on surface for this parking, a couple of things came out.

One, the tenants all favored trying to keep more green around the building, and to not encroach, or not reduce the buffer, not get any closer to the residential houses, actually try and stay as far away from them as they could, and keep as much of the buffer as they could, preserving as much green around the building as possible. But they also went through their own analysis and determined that the original parking

requirements that they had given us, they didn't feel that they were going to need or meet.

In fact, from their own personal experiences in terms of who was driving to the offices, who was taking public transportation, who was ride-sharing, et cetera, they each determined that they probably needed somewhere in the neighborhood of about 10 percent less than what their original leases required. And in fact, we have entered into amendments with those tenants that reduce their parking requirements in the building from the original by about 10 percent.

So we went back, and we looked at what could we do to optimize this, create a better buffer with the neighbors, encroach less; and that, combined with the lower parking load and parking demand from the tenants, we were able to accomplish that by meeting the parking requirements, certainly at roughly two and a half per thousand still, overall for the building -- which is again, 150 percent greater than the prior zone in place for laboratory research and development -- and preserve a significant buffer.

We actually presented plans to the neighbors.

Mike Meechan, who is a Prism employee who lives over

there, actually did present those plans and asked

various neighbors how they felt about it; and I think,

without a doubt, they were all highly in favor of preserving that buffer and reducing the amount of parking that we were putting in there. And we did encourage them to send some emails to the commissioners. I don't know whether you received any or not, but there seemed to be a lot of interest on the part of the neighbors there to preserve that.

So that's what we've accomplished with this, so I think this plan meets our requirements under our leases, exceeds what was considered previous zoning requirements for laboratory research and development. From our perspective, we think without a doubt, meets demand for current modern day laboratory space -- certainly as evidenced by the users that are in the building today, which are current, modern programmed research and development laboratory tenants; and we think it's a win/win for the community, in that it preserves the larger buffer zone between the houses and the building and the parking.

MS. GONCHAR: Rich, if you could just run through the numbers that we're proposing, and how they have been arrived at.

MR. PROCANIK: Yeah, sure, I would love to.

So just really simplistically, the redevelopment plan
requires certain parking ratio for -- depending on the

type of use. For the 111 Ideation Way, as it stands, 1 it was 498 as a minimum, to 830 as a maximum. 2 we've done -- what we do is, we were able to provide a 3 total of 146 parking spaces. We're going to leave that 4 existing front parking field of 120 in place, and then 5 propose an additional 26 around the east side, closer 6 7 to the residential, and then also allocate an 8 additional 10 spaces on Ideation Way to 111, which 9 would bring our grand total to 56 spaces allocated for 10 111. 11 That is the current plan that you have before If you go back in time the two years, as Meryl 12 you. and Gene had mentioned, there was the element of the 13 pilot plant. The parking ratio for that was one per 14 15 1,000, and the min/max on that -- sorry, let me just 16 pull it up on my screen. 17 MR. GENITEMPO: Hey, Rich, excuse me, it's 18 Alan. 19 MR. PROCANIK: Yes. 20 MR. GENITEMPO: And I appreciate what you're 21 Do you have any -- and I know you're not here 22 in person, and I know we did get the plans. Do you 23 have anything you can pull up on the screen just to 24 show --25 MR. PROCANIK: Yeah, absolutely.

MR. GENITEMPO: -- give us some perspective? 1 MS. GONCHAR: We didn't know we could screen 2 3 -- okay. MR. PROCANIK: Yeah, it would be my pleasure. 4 5 How could I do that? Commissioners, would that be 6 MR. GENITEMPO: 7 helpful? To see what he's referring to? 8 MAYOR TUCCI: Sure. 9 MS. GONCHAR: You have a screen share? Where would you be -- what would you be looking at for them 10 11 to see it? I think I figured it out, 12 MR. PROCANIK: 13 Meryl. It would be side-by-side comparison that --MS. GONCHAR: One of two? 14 15 MR. PROCANIK: -- we -- yes, the one and two. Please let me know if you can see this. And hopefully 16 that's a little bit better. And this is full-screen 17 18 for you guys? 19 MR. GENITEMPO: Yep. Okay, perfect. I'll just have 20 MR. PROCANIK: 21 my notes off to the side here. So going back in time, like I was saying, we submitted this layout, which 22 23 provided 228 parking spaces. Now, this consisted of 24 basically eliminating the current parking field and 25 reconstructing it in this matter as it's shown.

on Gene and Meryl's explanation, we decided to take a 1 less impactful route of this parking field and the 2 surrounding green spaces, so we were able to come up 3 with a parking layout where we utilized the existing 4 5 120 parking spaces -- and I can actually draw a box. Can you see that box? What with -- is that something 6 7 that you can see? And so this 120 parking spaces in 8 the front, we're going to leave as-is. We're going to 9 utilize the existing --MAYOR TUCCI: Can you speak up a little bit? 10 11 I'm having a hard time hearing you. I can see you but 12 I --13 MR. PROCANIK: Yes, sure. MAYOR TUCCI: -- can't hear you. 14 15 MR. PROCANIK: Is that better? 16 MS. GONCHAR: A little louder. MR. PROCANIK: Okay. So this front field is 17 18 120 parking spaces we're going to leave as is, it's how it exists today, and we're looking to expand the 19 parking field to the east. Now, this is the 20 21 residential property, if you can see my mouse, and the 22 additional parking we're proposing is along this 23 portion of the property. 24 This consists of an additional 26 parking We have 15 standard, six parallel, and five 25 spaces.

In addition to those 26, we're also proposing an 1 ADA. additional 10 spaces on Ideation to be allocated 2 towards the 111 parking field -- the building. 3 So with the reduction of our original 4 proposed plan that we had submitted, we originally 5 submitted a plan that showed 228 spaces. 6 7 mentioned we're looking to reduce that 228 to 156. 8 Now, if we look at the pilot plant, the pilot 9 plant requirement for parking, that requires 70 -we're proposing 72 less spaces, whereby the 10 redevelopment plan is 33 to 98 are required. 11 Because there's a minimum and a maximum. 12 So the spaces we're eliminating aligns with the redevelopment plan 13 requirements for that pilot plant. So our parking 14 15 ratio, even though we're removing the pilot plant, our parking ratio today -- I'm sorry, with this proposal, 16 will remain consistent with the previous plan we 17 18 submitted. 19 MS. GONCHAR: In other words, the number of spaces that were being eliminated fit within the 20 21 requirement that would have served the pilot plant that 22 we're no longer providing? 23 MR. PROCANIK: Correct. 24 MS. GONCHAR: Can you also -- I don't know if

this is the plan or if there's another one, Rich, but

25

we spoke about the buffer, and I think I had indicated that under the previous plan -- you know, actually, Rich, I know this is the actual landscaping, but can you go back to the other one? I just want you to give me the dimension. That has too much on it.

At the minimum, in the area to the south where the houses are closer to our development, on the previous proposed plan to the left, the measurement there, the closest point, and this is -- was pursuant to the plan, but the number, that's what we went down to, was that the closest we were to the residential?

MR. PROCANIK: Yes. It was 17.75 feet. The redevelopment plan required a minimum of 17.5 feet. So we were very close to the requirements that were set forth in the redevelopment plan.

MS. GONCHAR: All right. Can you go over to the proposal now, and at the same point where we were the closest, show us where that house would be vis-a-vis our -- the landscaping now?

MR. PROCANIK: Yeah. So our new closest point would be a little bit further south. It will be increased to 44.5 feet, as opposed to the 17.75 feet, and we're going to utilize the existing vegetation to maintain the buffer between the parking field and the residential developments.

MS. GONCHAR: Okay. To be fully transparent here, if you move up, though, we do have an area where we are closer, but is that consistent with the -- where we have the drive now, or is this -MR. PROCANIK: Yes.

MS. GONCHAR: -- are we -- okay.

MR. PROCANIK: We are not proposing the existing drive to encroach further east. This is where the current drive exists today. We're going to expand the drive a little bit further to the west. As you can see here, we have some parallel parking spaces, and some gore striping, but this curb line along the residential is not moving, and it will be the same distance as it is today.

MS. GONCHAR: Okay. So that's the nearest point, but that's existing. And below where we were going to cut off 20 something, we're maintaining that. Okay.

While you -- maybe this isn't the screen.

One of the items that I did not mention that is new as part of this proposal that we'd like to take to the planning board, we are seeking to subdivide.

And the lot line that you're showing on this plan, the southerly line, Rich, that reflects a proposed subdivision line? Is that correct?

MR. PROCANIK: That is correct.

MS. GONCHAR: All right. Do you have the plan that we also submitted to the commissioners, which was Layout Plan Sheet 2.0? While you're -- oh, good. The -- for the commissioners, we are seeking to subdivide off a 1.2 acre parcel which does exceed the redevelopment plan minimum lot requirement of one acre. And the piece that we're taking off is, in large part, the piece that would have been utilized for construction of the pilot plant.

Because that is no longer being proposed, we have proposed the lot as indicated. This lot would be wholly within the Phase 2A plan area, and frankly, can't be merged with anything else at the moment, because if the commissioners will recall, south of the southerly line as shown on this plan, the property remains in the M.O. zone, because that was not included by design in the Phase 2A redevelopment plan area. So this would be another lot. Gene could certainly speak to it.

We're not proposing a site plan, but the lot was laid out to indicate all of the requisite setbacks under the redevelopment plan. The acreage is as proposed under the redevelopment plan -- as required, I should say, under the redevelopment plan. So this is

- simply a subdivision to provide flexibility at the present time, because otherwise, it's land that is not proposed to be utilized, since we won't -- will not be proceeding with the pilot plant.
- I think, Rich, the only other thing I see, is there a small courtyard outside the entrance? I think that would have been part of the connection between the pilot plant and the main building?
 - MR. PROCANIK: Yes. As an amenity to the tenants of 111, we are proposing a small patio area outside. It's relatively small. It's going to be a couple of tables, so that someone can go out there, eat some lunch, maybe take a phone call. But it's going to be, you know, an addition on the south side of 111.
 - MS. GONCHAR: I just wanted to point that out, because that would not have shown on an earlier plan, because that would have been where a connection to the pilot plant would have been --
- MR. PROCANIK: Yes.

- MS. GONCHAR: -- located.
- MR. PROCANIK: Yes. And one other thing,

 Meryl, is a minor change, is we are now proposing

 security gates entering into the parking fields from

 the west and also from the east.
- MS. GONCHAR: And that is -- that the -- to

- 1 accommodate the tenants?
- 2 MR. PROCANIK: Yeah. Yes. It's to limit
- 3 access to only authorized personnel. I believe they're
- 4 both wholly in Clifton, with the exception of maybe a
- 5 couple of feet of curbing.
- 6 MR. DIAZ: Yeah, if I may, Meryl, it's Gene
- 7 Diaz speaking again. The gates are being put in
- 8 because -- to control parking, you know, Hackensack
- 9 does charge its students for parking; and as a result,
- 10 there has been some attempt by students to avoid their
- 11 parking charge by parking in other lots of the
- 12 building. And we're protecting that right to ensure
- 13 the appropriate parking counts for this building by
- 14 installing fob key type gates, just the same way we
- 15 have it in the 100-200 garage.
- 16 MS. GONCHAR: And that's really all of our
- 17 presentation. Those are the changes from what we have
- 18 previously shown you. And as far as the percentages,
- 19 we are approximately at what we would have been before,
- 20 but without the pilot plant contributing to the parking
- 21 demand. And then the -- obviously, the subdivision
- 22 being the other item; but again, that is designed to
- 23 meet the standards of the redevelopment plan.
- 24 MAYOR TUCCI: Okay. Thank you.
- 25 MS. GONCHAR: So we believe that we've

remained consistent, and we'd ask the commissioners to 1 find so that we can proceed to the planning board for 2 3 approval. MR. GENITEMPO: Commissioners, does anyone 4 5 have any questions of Meryl or --MAYOR TUCCI: That's exactly where I was 6 7 going. Commissioner Scarpelli? 8 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: I have a couple 9 questions, Meryl. MS. GONCHAR: 10 Uh-huh. 11 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: And Gene, 12 congratulations on 200 Metro. Thank you, Commissioner. 13 MR. DIAZ: It's -you know, in the middle of a pandemic, with no state 14 15 incentives, to have pulled this off, this is a real unicorn, and I think we should all take stock in the 16 good fortune we've been able to get. And this is a 17 18 company that we are just so enthusiastic about, given the pipeline of drugs, one of the most robust pipe --19 drug pipelines in the market. 20 21 And if you would have seen about three days before we finalized an agreement with them, the New 22 23 York Times printed a publication that this is the first 24 -- the company with the first Alzheimer's drug that

will be released to market in expedited approval Phase

- 3 with the FDA right now.
- 2 So we're looking forward to a very long and
- 3 hopefully growing relationship with Eisai
- 4 Pharmaceuticals here at the campus. So thank you for

 Most recently, Modern Meadow signed an expansion of
 their lease, to take a portion of the basement space
 that -- where they're going to do some additional
 production-type work, that would have occurred in the
 pilot plant.

So they're going to do a very much more scaled down version of this, and a lot of this has to do with their evolving technology's been getting better and better, and they just don't need the kind of space that the pilot plant was going to provide to do what they're doing, to accomplish getting their product to market.

So, yeah, with the calculations that we did for the leases, and for the total parking that we need included, 23 spaces for the lower level, which includes y-mAbs, any of the space that's occupied by -- occupiable by Modern Meadow, and the balance of the

space down there is actually storage, so it's not occupiable. It's actually rented to both Hackensack and Modern Meadow as either storage or glass washing and other common service spaces, like glass washing and sterilization.

adjacent land.

So they're not occupied spaces. They're used by the tenants for purposes of laboratory functions, and they bring their bottles downstairs and their sterile test tubes and things, and they're washed and sterilized and taken care of and treated in the basement. So yes, so the building is, for all intents and purposes, 100 percent occupied.

So the taxes still get paid to the 16 In this instance, they get paid by Prism on the subdivided lot. But it's a way of helping 17 18 economically, especially during these tough times with COVID, when these tenants are having a difficult time 19 utilizing their spaces and still paying rent, and all 20 21 of our tenants have been paying rent. I think that's admirable, and I think it's 22 23 important to consider. But this will assist the 24 tenants by sort of lowering, even a little bit, the 25 amount of money that they're paying with respect to the

full expenses and expenses on the building, and 1 transferring that obligation over to Prism. 2 MS. GONCHAR: And actually, if we were to 3 wait and do it at a subsequent time, in conjunction 4 with another parcel, we would simply be pulling another 5 whole lot under -- into the planning board application 6 7 for no reason. So at this time, whatever happens with 8 that lot, it moves independent and doesn't implicate 9 the 111 parcel for any future application. It was a very wise, very quick move on their part that created a safe zone, and prevented the two sides from confronting each other. I thought that that was quick thinking. I was there as a witness, and I'd like to commend them on that.

I do have three things I would like to bring up on the other hand, that I would like to bring to your attention, and hopefully you can address. One is, I was very distressed to see police officers going into that No Man's Land with guns on their hips. I felt that it was really uncalled for; that it created tension; and that if being armed was important, that police could have been armed on the periphery, and that the policemen who were in -- who were sent into the center to bring down tensions between the two sides should have entered without arms. So I'd like to bring that to your attention.

The second thing is, I'd like to call to your attention the issue that I'm sure aware of, of the gentleman who posted a photo on Twitter, and was then -- there were -- then was then prosecuted. The case was overturned by the Essex County, I believe, saying that there wasn't sufficient evidence to prosecute him and a few other people who posted on Twitter.

I'm not going to call into question whether or not that prosecution should have happened. That's outside of anything I have knowledge of, but I do want to point out that the officer in question was wearing a Blue Lives Matter mask. In the case of being a neutral party, and somebody who should have been there, who

could have been perceived by either side as neutral, 1 that wearing a mask of a political persuasion was 2 inappropriate, and clearly set him as being anti-Black 3 Lives Matter protestors. I don't know what Nutley's 4 position is on it, but I do feel that Nutley ought to 5 have a position, and require that policemen who are 6 7 acting in service of the community be neutral arbiters 8 of justice. 9 The third thing I'd like to point out is that the said officer had his badge covered up, and I'd like 10 to find out, a question for the commissioners, is that 11 Nutley's practice, to allow police officers to engage 12 with the public with badges that are covered up, 13 meaning that they can't be identified? 14 15 I don't know if you take -- if you do answer community questions at this point; but I think that, at 16 the very least, that's some -- that officers should be 17 18 disciplined for covering up a badge when he was in 19 service to the community. taxpayers in three years, when there's no more money to

run the squad because they're losing \$230,000 a year?

There was no denial. 6 7 was no offer at that meeting. The answer was, well, 8 we'll look at the documents. And after that, it's been 9 nothing but stonewalling. MS. ACKERMAN: 10 Okay. 11 MR. GENITEMPO: I was at that meeting. 12 MS. ACKERMAN: I just -- I don't see how this 13
 - MS. ACKERMAN: I just -- I don't see how this is going to work. I really don't. I -- you're asking for documents. From what I'm told, you're offered the documents, and you're going to do this anyway. And I don't understand. Your document is from -- your Ordinance 60 is from 1953, and it addresses the Nutley First Aid Squad, which has not been a -- in existence since 1976. So it's kind of hard to see how that follows.

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Also, their incorporation paperwork, that gives them the autonomy, does not include the Board of Commissioners, nor does it include the Director of Public Service.

MR. GENITEMPO: Ms. Ackerman, if you look at

the Articles of Incorporation as one thing. If you look at the bylaws of the squad, you will see in the bylaws -- and I don't know if you've read them, I have. A significant authority rests in the Commissioner of Public (audio interference) which is the law of the town. So that incorporation was in 1953, and just because someone's a corporation does not mean they cannot come under the authority or control or oversight of the Commissioner of Public Safety.

So I know they keep saying they're a separate corporation. I don't understand that. That's a fiction in this situation. They're a hybrid, and they exist because we helped them get 501(c)(3) non-profit designation. We helped them become able to bill. The town was subsidizing them up to that point in time, so -- and still continues to subsidize them on an annual basis. You may not be told that, but we provide the insurance, we provide the building, we provide the maintenance, we provide a lot of service without any reimbursement.

So the town has an absolute stake in the financial survival of the squad. And if they continue to do what they're doing, at least we can see from the 990s they filed, they're not going to be in existence much longer, the way they're operating. So we need to

see the documents, to make sure everything is correct, 1 and maybe even provide assistance down the road. 2 But we can't continue without transparency. 3 MS. ACKERMAN: Okay, agreed. So now I have 4 5 to ask, since, God rest their souls, Mr. and Mrs. Paulson have passed away, they were president and 6 7 vice president. Since that time, what communication has there been from Commissioner Petracco to the First 8 9 Aid Squad or the Rescue Squad, as to what he wants as a business plan; as to what documents he needs to see on 10 a monthly, on a quarterly basis? 11 12 There's been no connection. In fact, 13 Commissioner Petracco has not shown up to install officers in four years. They can't remember the last 14 15 time he was in the building. And then, bam, they buy an ambulance, and all of a sudden, all these questions 16 17 are raised. I'm sorry, my --18 MR. GENITEMPO: Ms. Ackerman --MS. ACKERMAN: -- eyebrows are raised. 19 MR. GENITEMPO: -- with all due respect, I 20 21 think that frankly, they're feeding you a lot of There has been communication between 22 misinformation. 23 squad members and the commissioner over the years, but 24 there was also a trust factor, a trust relationship. 25 Now there is no trust, because the people running the

- squad have no desire to allow the commissioner -- or 1 Commissioner Petracco to review any of their financial 2 documents. That's the plain fact. It doesn't matter 3 what happened three or four, five years ago. 4 5 commissioner has been in touch with squad members, and he's being told that things are not running very well 6 7 over there. 8 So there's two sides to every story. And I 9 know you're getting their side. But frankly, if they give us the documents, maybe a lot of the concerns can 10 be resolved, and that's quite simple. And we've had a 11 non-disclosure agreement in place for them to exchange 12
- understand where -- what their position is, frankly,

- other than to hide the documents from the township.
- 16 I'm sorry.

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- 17 MAYOR TUCCI: Okay. Thank you, Ms. Ackerman.

the documents. We agreed to that.

- MR. GENITEMPO: I said, I'm sorry, but that's
- 22 at least my position on behalf of the commissioners. I
- 23 admit -- I don't know if you heard that part.
- 24 MS. ACKERMAN: Okay, no, that kind of went
- 25 kind of fuzzy, but I just -- so you're telling me that

- they gave me false information, that there was not a 1 meeting between the Board of Trustees, and Commissioner 2 Petracco, or whoever else attended, and you said you 3 attended, that the documents were not offered, that you 4 5 were requested. MR. GENITEMPO: That's --6 7 MS. ACKERMAN: You're telling me that never 8 occurred. 9 MR. GENITEMPO: There was a meeting, I said 10 there was a meeting. 11 MS. ACKERMAN: No -- you -- I agree. MR. GENITEMPO: (Audio interference) not offer 12 13 the documents. They wanted to know what documents we wanted, and I told them that I would send them our 14 15 documents, which I did the next day, and that -- and the list of things we were looking for, and when they 16 got them, it was crickets. You ever heard that term, 17 18 "crickets" on the other side --
- 19 MS. ACKERMAN: I --

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- MR. GENITEMPO: -- until we got a formal letter basically telling us, you're not getting anything. We're a completely separate entity, we don't owe you anything. You have no right to oversight.
- But in your last attorney's letter, or their
 last attorney's letter, the attorney fully acknowledged

the Board, the Township's obligations --1 MS. ACKERMAN: I lost you. 2 MR. GENITEMPO: Your attorney -- or the 3 squad's attorney, fully acknowledged --4 5 MS. ACKERMAN: Okay, I got you. MR. GENITEMPO: -- the town's obligation for 6 7 oversight of the squad in a letter he wrote to me. I don't know how you could agree that we have oversight 8 9 responsibility, yet refuse to give us the documents we're requesting to do our oversight. 10 It can't be, oh, you can have one bank statement, and by the way -- this 11 was the condition, Ms. Ackerman. Commissioner 12 13 Petracco's the only one can see it, and he has to see it with two squad members present. Oh, and he can't 14 15 take a copy of it. Oh, and by the way, the Fire Chief can't be there. 16 Now, do you think that's a good faith 17 18 turnover of documents, or offer of documents to the 19 commissioner? It was --20 Well, my first --MS. ACKERMAN: 21 MR. GENITEMPO: -- frankly, it was insulting to argue that the commissioner has to have two 22 23 representatives of the squad oversee him looking at the 24 document, as if somehow he's going to roll it up and 25 put it in his pocket. It's -- frankly, a ridiculous

insult, and just further shows the attitude of the board of the squad in not producing the documents.

- And I have no problem giving you that letter, if you don't have a copy of it. And if you're not insulted by the squad's position, then I don't know what to say. But frankly, I was insulted, and it wasn't even about me. So I think there's a lot of issues there that just further make it clear that transparency is necessary. And you can't have a little bit of transparency. You can have all transparency, or
- MS. ACKERMAN: Well, from what I understand, the documents that were legally required to be turned over were turned over.
 - MR. GENITEMPO: What case are you citing to,
 Ms. Ackerman? What case law says that they don't have
 to give us those documents? I know --
- MS. ACKERMAN: Would --

no transparency.

MR. GENITEMPO: -- they keep citing they don't have an obligation, a legal obligation; but frankly, you can say that all you want. I'm a lawyer. I have no -- know of no law that prevents them from turning over those documents to us. So that's all I'm trying to tell you. They can say all the things they want, misinformation, half-truths. That's the truth.
